# NEW COAL PRICES

ARE ANNOUNCED

Sixty Per Cent of Estimated Supply Mined -The New Schedule

Washington, Nov. 7—New prices for anthracite coal, revised to meet increased labor costs, were announced today by Fuel Administrator Garfield, effective on coal mined on or after November 1. At that time aproximately 60 per cent of the estimated season's 25 at 60 per cent of the estimated sea

60 per cent of the estimated season's supply had been mined and all of this under the fuel administrator's order, will be sold at existing prices.

The new schedule, which carries without change the existing differential between large companies and the individual operators, in favor of the latter, ranges for the white ash grade from \$4.80 a ton for companies and \$5.55 for individuals to \$6.25 a ton for companies and \$6.95 for individuals appearance of the size, whether broken, egg, stove, nut or pea.



15th day of November Cause to be furnished to the Workmen's Compensation Board at the City of St. John, an estimate or estimates of the probable amount of the payroll of each of his industries within the scope of Part 1 of the Act, together with such further information as may be required by the Board for the purpose of assigning such industry to the proper class or classes, and of making

### the assessment hereunder And Further Notice

That any Employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part 11
