WALL STREET.

New York, Nov. 8.—Leading stocks
opened at sharp declines today as a re-
sult of yesterday's false reports of the
signing of a truce between Germany and
the Allies. Reactions of 1 to 4% points
were registered at the opening by Mex-
ican Petroleum and many of the lead-
ing rails as well as secondary issues of
that division. Coppers broke an average
of one point and motors fell back with
prominent specialties. The few early
gains were represented by Marine pre-
ferred, American Sugar and Sumatra
Tobacco, the latter rising four points.
The market strengthened in all quarters
before the end of the first half hour.

Every employer shall, on or before the
15th day of November

Cause to be furnished to the Workmen's Compensation Board at the City
of St. John, an estimate or estimates of the probable amount of the payroll
of each of his industries within the scope of Part I of the Act, together with
such further information as may be required by the Board for the purpose
of assigning such industry to the proper class or classes, and of making
the assessment hereunder.

And Further Notice

That any Employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or infor-
mation is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of
such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II
of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during
the period of such default.

NOTE—Forms for furnishing such information will be supplied on
application.

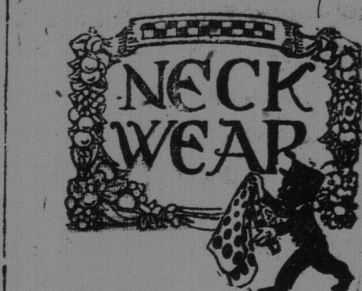

KAISER'S BROTHER WAVES RED FLAG

Washington, Nov. 7.—New prices for
anthracite coal, revised to meet in-
creased labor costs, were announced to-
day by Fuel Administrator Garfield, ef-
fective on coal mined on or after No-
vember 1. At that time approximately
60 per cent of the estimated season's
supply had been mined and all of this
under the fuel administrator's order,
will be sold at existing prices.
The new schedule, which carries with-
out change the existing differential be-
tween large companies and the individ-
ual operators, in favor of the latter,
ranges for the white ash grade from
\$4.50 a ton for companies and \$5.55 for
individuals to \$6.25 a ton for com-
panies and \$6.95 for individuals, depend-
ing upon the size, whether broken, egg,
store, nut or pea.
