

Any person, except a traveller on a journey, found on Sunday carrying firearms, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, and in default of payment, to imprisonment for a per-iod not exceeding one month.

Any person, except a traveller on a journey, found on the shooting grounds carrying firearms, with or without dcgs, between the 15th day of December and the 20 h day of September in succeeding year, where such game is known to frequent, shall be subject to a fine
