## Miners Chosen as Alaskan Congress Delegates

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 27.—Alaska has elected two miners to seats in the House of Representatives as her territorial delegates. They defeated the Republican and Democratic nominees in the elections last week by overwhelming majorities, and their election is looked on as Alaska's protest against broken promises by the national government and neglect of her interests and opposition to wealthy corporations. The new delegates are Thomas Cole, elected by 321 plurality, for the long term, and Frank Waseley, who received 2385 majority, for the short term. Cole is a native of Wisconsin, is known as "Honest Tom" in Fairbanks, his home town, and has been a miner since 1897. Frank Waseley was told of his nomination in the shirt of one of his miners.

## ETIQUETTE AND THE SWORD

Militia Orders Post Officers as to When to Wear Their Weapons.

OTTAWA, August 28.—Militia orders in reference to the wearing of swords. They are to be worn by officers at all times when on duty, and on parade with men bearing arms, except at musketry and artillery practice. At field manoeuvres commanding officers may permit carbines to be carried instead of swords, provided all times when on duty, and on parade. It is announced that Capt. H. Clay Corps of Guides, will act as adjutant and quartermaster to the Corps of Guides at Camp Aldershot. The Minister of Militia has authorized the formation of a cadet corps at St. John's.

Killed by an Electric Car—Man Charged With the Murder of His Wife.

LEWISTON, Me., Aug. 28.—Louis Emmond, 39 years old, was struck by an electric car on the Lewiston Brunswick and Bath street railway late this afternoon, and died instantly. He was walking on the track and as he was heard of hearing did not know the car was approaching. He is survived by five children.  
NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—All but two of the thirty Jewish orphans who were ordered deported by the Ellis Island authorities were released from the immigration station this evening under orders from the Department of Commerce and Labor at Washington. The children arrived here Saturday on the steamship America.

BOSTON, Aug. 28.—Robert H. Long, of Chelsea, was arrested tonight on a charge of attempting to kill his wife Jennie H. Long, at River Street resort. Mrs. Long was shot four times and is in a serious condition at Frost Hospital in Chelsea. Long attempted to shoot himself but the revolver had been emptied in his attack on his wife. It is said that the couple had quarrelled and separated.

## SUICIDE BURIED WITHOUT A PRAYER

Sad and Dramatic Scene in a British Churchyard.  
"Law of England Has Been Kept To-night," Clergyman's Reply to a Mourner Who Reproached Him.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—There was a sad, dramatic scene on Friday night in the churchyard at Beaconsfield, at the burial of a suicide, who shot himself after attempting murder. The jury's verdict was *felix de se*, and in accordance with the rules of the Church of England, the dead man had to be buried between the hours of nine and midnight. The coffin, closely followed by the suicide's weeping sister and other relatives, was brought into the churchyard by a special entrance. The mourners grouped themselves around the grave by the dim light of a few lanterns. Close by stood the clergyman. For a few moments there was a pause, the mourners evidently hoping that he would offer a prayer, but the clergyman, in obedience to the rubrics of the prayer book, did not speak, and the coffin was lowered into the grave in tense silence, which was only broken at last by the cry of the dead man's sister, "May God have mercy on his soul—more mercy than he has had from man!" Silence fell again, this time to be broken by a man who advanced to the clergyman and said: "Are you a priest?" "I am," was the reply. "Have you not said one prayer over this man?" "Not one," the clergyman replied with evident emotion. "By what right do you ask?" "By the threefold right of an Englishman and a Christian professing to be a member of the Church of England," was the answer. The clergyman then said:—"The law of England has been kept tonight." By this time a large crowd had gathered, and a noisy scene ensued.
