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**CENTENNIAL OF GREELEY'S BIRTH TO BE FITTINGLY CELEBRATED TODAY**

**Great Journalist Was Born 100 Years Ago Today--To Erect Monument on Beloved Farm**

\*\*\*\*\*  
 Born Feb. 3, 1811, near Man- chester, N. H.  
 Had three short terms in very primitive public school.  
 Read Pilgrim's Progress and the Bible at six.  
 A printer at fifteen.  
 When twenty he was in New York city.  
 Started several weekly and daily papers; all failed.  
 Married in 1836 to Mary Y. Cheney, several children.  
 Started the Tribune in 1848.  
 Served short term in congress; exposed mileage frauds.  
 Ran for presidency in 1872; de- feated by Grant.  
 Died Nov. 29, 1873; sixty-one years old.  
 Best known saying:—"Go west, young man, go west, and grow up with the country."

**Horace Greeley.**

The above boxed sketch would tell fairly well the lives of some men. But bare statistics fall far, far short of telling about Horace Greeley, not even suggest the terrible struggle from poverty and ignorance to thorough education and national power; for Greeley was born at the bottom and rose to the top.  
 Born to be printer, editor, reformer he could read the printed word upside down, sideways and right side up from the book on his mother's knee as she ran her spinning wheel before he was two years old.  
 At five years of age he announced that he was going to be a printer—and he had never seen a printer at that time.  
 His father was improvident, or un- lucky, and Horace Greeley's boyhood was one of hard work and discourag- ing struggle with poverty, scanty clothing, and, at times, insufficient food. They moved from farm to farm, town to town, state to state, some- times because the sheriff said so!  
 But his mother was always right—and to this must be attributed much of Greeley's wonderful pluck.  
 He would not be defeated. He pos- itively refused to stay down. For one newspaper after another to fail did not deter him.  
 Finally he started the New York Tribune. Then Greeley was on the right path.  
 He was where he could wield a pow- erful, untrammelled pen—and he wielded it for the common people; and the people responded by making his paper in two years a much greater organ than it is today.  
 Reform! Reform! was his constant cry; reform the social condition. So he gladly talked with socialists, or any others who thought they had ideas that would help the under dog. He had been the under dog all his life, and he appreciated it.  
 Thinking reform, in his journal, writing reform, he made hosts of en- emies—and loved them. He was called dangerous, and wrote furious re- plies in the Tribune, not hesitating to use personal language.  
 Greeley was right. All others were wrong, according to Greeley.  
 Fighting stout battles for humanity, the influence of his journal, though enormous, was an elderly man in the middle or western states today is glad he responded as a youth to Greeley's cry: "Go west, young man, go west!"  
 One of the heroic figures in the combat against slavery, his labors for the emancipation of the black man must always be remembered. Those who created the condition which required and brought forward Lincoln. Indeed, it was Horace Gree- ley who was more influential than any other man, except Lincoln himself, in making Lincoln president.  
 Bitterly attacked for his views and replying with as great heat, Greeley was also ridiculed for his views. The fact that less than \$50 was spent on his clothing up to the time he was twenty-one, seemed to leave an indelible impression on his mind. He was discharged once, as a printer, from the New York Evening Post, because the Post wanted "de- cent looking men on its staff."  
 He always wore clothes that out- raged fashion. Later, when a power- ful editor Greeley's long white over- coat was one of the sights of Broad- way in New York and Pennsylvania avenues in Washington. His top boots, his fringe of whiskers, his hat worn on the back of his head as if he thus freed pressure on his frontal brain so he could think better, all brought ridicule upon him. But he cared not- ing for that.  
 Greeley married wisely and hap- pily. And he died because his wife was dead; for a month before her death he was at her bedside, or on the stump advocating his own elec- tion to the presidency, going with less than one hour's sleep out of each 24. And after her death he could not sleep. It was sorrow—sorrow over her death and at his defeat; but his principal because he had lost his most efficient helpmate, that killed Horace Greeley.  
 Greeley was dying. His lips moved and eager ears listened to his last words:  
 "\*\*\*\*\*"

"With an awe that is not fear and a consciousness of demerit which does not exclude hope, I await the opening before my steps at the gates of the eternal world."  
 His funeral was one of the greatest New York city ever saw. Fifty thou- sand people gazed in sorrow, the greater part of them (especially the poor) through tears, upon his calm, benignant face, as all that remained of the great fighter lay in state in city hall, New York. His funeral pro- ceSSION was miles long.  
 Today the great editor will be hon- ored by the dedication of a memorial at his beloved farm near Chippaquan, New York.  
 A Specimen of Greeley's Handwriting, and his Signature,  
*Some of the most stirring words ever written and copied.*  
 Greeley's written words, dashed off at great speed, were over the terror of printers. "Some people say it looks like a diagram of the crooked of seven."  
 "Gentlemen, I shall not attend your meeting this evening. I have an engagement."  
 "I do not recognize you as capable of judging, or even fully apprehending me. You evidently regard me as a weak seat- mentalist, misled by maudlin philosophy. I arraign you as narrow-minded BLOCKHEADS."  
 "I do not wear my heart upon my sleeve."  
 "I have no right to life the veil which shrouds the repose of MY DEAD."  
 My son Arthur ("Pickie") bore decided similarity to both his father, and mother, but with decided superiority, as a whole, to both. I looked in vain through Italian art galleries two years after he was taken from us, for any full parallel to his dazzling beauty—a beauty not physical merely, but visibly radiating from his soul. His hair was of finest richest gold; the sunshine of picture never equalled its story. And the delicacy of his complexion at once fixed the attention of critical travelled observers. Pickie was thoroughly human, and very wise. But Pickie is gone, and the sun shines darkly.  
 The second paragraph relates to the death of his favorite child, at the age of seven.  
 Here we have both sides of the great editor; the intolerant, impatient, brutal side, when dealing with men whom he thought had misjudged or wronged him; and the tender human side.
