Director of San Sebastrian
Casino Shot Dead—Lon-

San Sebastian, Spain, Sept. 17.—M. Bouelle, director of the San Sebastian Casino, was shot dead last night before the eyes of 1,500 persons gathered around the gaming tables.

Big Hotel Fire.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 17.—Two hundred and fifty guests of the Hotel Brocree were routed out of bed early this morning by a fire that swept through an adjoining building and set the upper floors of the hotel ablaze. Many of the guests rushed to the street, leaving all their belongings behind them and several unconscious women were carried to the street by the firemen.

Clerks Demand Rights.

London, Sept. 17.—The "black-coat" worker made his first demonstration in Hyde Park on Sunday in favour of trades unionism, following tactics similar to those adopted by the laborer and artisan, who were holding meetings nearby.

The participants, many of whom were women, were all clerks, representing a great variety of employment. They marched from the Thames Embankment to Hyde Park, wearing black masks with the object of "avoiding victimization."

Wreck Narrowly Averted.

Toronto, Sept. 17.—With both tracks of the main line blocked with ties the fast limited train of the Grand Trunk Railway from Chicago had a narrow escape from being wrecked Tuesday afternoon near Little Lake Station, a local stop a few miles east of the Stratford terminals. The ties were lying upon the track in such a position that the engineer did not see the obstruction until the locomotive and tender and baggage cars had passed over it before the train could be brought to a stop.

But for the fact that the ties had been exposed in the open for some time and were partially decayed, a bad wreck would have occurred.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency nearest to the land to be homesteaded, and made at the office of any Local Agent or Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.
