THE WAR CALL SOUNDED FROM CITY PULPITS

Local pastors yesterday urged young men to heed the appeal for recruits.

In the Main street Baptist church last evening Rev. David Hutchinson preached on the war, and urged the importance of young men volunteering to go to the front. He preached from 1st Timothy, 1-18: "A good warfare." He spoke of the colossal character of the present war, and the great array of men and armaments, and referred to Lord Kitchener's recent statement that in order to bring the conflict to a successful close more men and still more men would be needed.

THE GROWTH OF BRITAIN INQUEST NOT NECESSARY

Rev. J.J. McCaskill reviews history of the Empire under title of Heavenly arithmetic.

Rev. J. J. McCaskill in St. Matthews' Presbyterian church yesterday preached the third of a series of sermons in which he is showing the growth of Britain's power. "Heavenly Arithmetic" was the subject chosen yesterday and the preacher showed in masterly fashion the manner in which England's power has grown, which Napoleon depended on the strength of his army, but Britain went more on the idea of the English poet, who said, "Trices in her armed who hath his quarrel just."

Drowning in Courtenay Bay Saturday morning purely accidental.

Dr. W. F. Roberts, the coroner, has decided that the circumstances surrounding the death by drowning of Roland Richard Carter, was in the nature of the dredge Don Frederico in Courtenay Bay during the gale Saturday morning were purely accidental and that an inquest was unnecessary. Dr. Roberts yesterday and Saturday made a careful enquiry concerning the accident and found nothing to warrant an inquest. He examined all the surviving members of the crew, and their stories all showed that everything possible had been done to rescue the men.

SUGGESTS GIFT OF FISH FOR BRITAIN

Maritime Provinces might well have sent one in opinion of A. H. Brittain.

"Business as usual is our motto," said A. H. Brittain, business manager of the big Maritime Fish Corporation. "Our Canadian business has been good and we find our western markets growing in importance. The export fish trade has been rather demoralized since the outbreak of war and there is considerable uncertainty as to the future of the export business. Why will be the effect of the closing of the North Sea to fishermen is hard to tell. Hundreds of trawlers are now employed sweeping for mines. There will be a decided falling off in fish production on the other side and the people there will probably have to eat various salt fish which they have been sending to American and other markets. British people are accustomed to fresh fish and it may take some time for them to get used to salt fish."

YOUNG WOMAN HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Miss Violet Perrell struck by car—Now in hospital in serious condition.

A sad accident occurred Saturday night about eleven o'clock near the corner of Mill and Pond streets as the result of which Miss Violet Perrell was badly injured and fears are entertained for her recovery. Miss Perrell is said to have been on her way to the I. C. R. depot to meet a friend expected on the Boston express. She had just alighted from a street car when an automobile operated by Harry Doody came along. The auto struck the young woman and after dragging her along the pavement for some distance is said to have run over her. She was picked up unconscious and hurried to the General Public Hospital where, although no bones could be found broken, she was found to be suffering from shock and concussion of the brain. She had not regained consciousness at an early hour this morning. Miss Perrell is a native of Maine and is employed in an up-town grocery. She has been stopping with friends on Douglas Avenue.
