

Annual Meeting Of The Y. W. C. A.

Reports Received from Different Committees Showed Good Progress—Addresses by Local Clergy.

Glowing reports from the different departments of the Y. W. C. A. characterized the annual meeting of that organization, which was held last evening in the recreational centre, King street east. Mrs. John A. McAvity, president of the association, was in the chair, and in addition to the reading of the reports for the year's work addresses were given by Rev. Canon Armstrong, Rev. Harry B. Clarke and Rev. H. A. Goodwin. During the course of the evening Mrs. John A. McAvity, who is retiring from the presidency this year, was made the recipient of two beautiful bouquets of roses, one of which was presented to her by Miss Margaret Whalen, on behalf of the Y. W. C. A. Club, and the other by Mrs. Alfred Morrissey, on behalf of the directors. Mrs. McAvity responded to the presentation.

Mrs. James P. Robertson read the report of the immigration and travel department, which showed that during the past year 1,051 persons had been received at the travellers' home; 8,440 trains and 278 boats had been met; 1,223 persons had been assisted at the depot; and employment had been found for 71. A grant of \$540 was received from the Dominion Government, and it is hoped that a like amount will be forthcoming from the Provincial Government. The report also showed that the financial situation of the department for the year was not of the best, there being a deficit of \$1,800. Mrs. Robertson paid a glowing tribute to Miss Hoyt and Miss Kline, the travellers' aid workers, who have done such good work since taking charge of the department.

The Business Girls' Home report was read by Mrs. W. H. Leggett, and among other things set out that the attendance, which averaged 25, had not been so large as hitherto. The report also showed that the girls had benefited from the social programme which had been carried out during the year.

Mrs. W. C. Cross read the cafeteria report, which contained a statement of the affairs in connection with that establishment, which is now completing its third year, and is under the efficient management of Miss MacKenzie, the general secretary, who is leaving to take up this work elsewhere. Regretful mention was also made of the departure of Miss Jean Somerville, who will leave to take up work in China. Expressions of regret were also voiced at the fact that Mrs. McAvity was retiring from the presidency. The report reviewed the activities of the different clubs in the Y. W. C. A., including the Corona Club, which has a membership of 25; the Booster Club, which has a membership of 52, and the C. G. I. T.

The membership report was read by Mrs. H. A. Goodwin, and showed that there had been an increase in membership and funds over last year, due to the energetic work of the church conveners. The receipts for the year in this department were \$1,116.34, an increase of \$200 over the same period previously.

In reading the treasurer's report, Mrs. T. H. Somerville outlined the financial condition in which the association is placed, which is not of the best owing to the fact that there are heavy expenses incurred from maintaining three separate establishments. The report of Miss Milligan, the financial secretary, was also read. Miss Innes MacKenzie, the general secretary, gave her report on the year's work of the association, which contained a clear exposition of the good the association was doing, and the difficulties with which they had to cope.

Mrs. E. C. Weyman gave the report of the physical department, making special reference to the splendid gymnastic exhibition presented last week in the Imperial theatre. She paid a tribute to the excellent work of Miss G. L. Littlefield, the instructor, and reviewed the programme of activities carried out since last summer, making particular reference to the basketball record of the girls, and the activities of the Indoor-Outdoor Club. The financial statement of the department showed a deficit of about \$215, which will be completely covered by the returns of the recent exhibition in the Imperial.

The report of the nominating committee showed that the new directors to hold office for three years are as follows: Mesdames J. F. Robertson, W. A. Robertson, T. H. Somerville, W. C. Cross, E. C. Weyman, A. E. Leggett, H. B. Peck, A. C. Skelton. Those who will hold office for two more years are: Mesdames E. J. Fleetwood, H. A. Goodwin, L. G. Crosby, G. W. Parker, A. W. Estey, G. Polty, R. Travis, and Miss Alice King. The other directors, who have still one year of office are: Mesdames J. D. Hunter, R. A. Jamieson, J. A. McAvity, A. Morrissey, C. Clarke, W. H. Leggett, R. T. Hayes, E. A. Powell.

At the close of the business meeting, eloquent addresses were given by Rev. Canon Armstrong, Rev. Harry B. Clarke and Rev. H. A. Goodwin, who all paid a tribute to the splendid work of the association.
