

A Multitude Succumbing to the Heat.

Saturday was the warmest day St. John has experienced in 13 years with an exception and that was on May 30 of the present year.

The highest temperature officially was 87 in the shade, registered at the local observatory in the afternoon. The same temperature was recorded at the observatory May 30 last, but the heat was short duration and was caused in part by heavy forest fires in this vicinity.

At Cleveland, Aug. 11.—There were seven prostrations and one death from the heat in Cleveland today.

At Philadelphia, Aug. 11.—The thermometer registered 100 degrees. The week has been one of intense heat and excessive humidity, resulting in numerous fatalities and scores of prostrations.

At Baltimore, Aug. 11.—The records of the weather bureau in this city show no instance of so protracted a hot spell as during the present week.

At Toronto, Aug. 11.—The number of deaths reported at the medical health office for the week ending today was 128, 16 of which occurred today.

Eleven People Killed While as Many Were Injured.

Slatton, P., Aug. 12.—Fifteen persons were instantly killed and 11 others, several of whom will die, were seriously injured tonight in a grade crossing accident.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Six deaths here were due to the heat today, the eighth day of the fatal spell, and there were 25 prostrations, the highest which will prove fatal.
