the board of health: At the special meeting of the municipal council, held in November last, a committee from such council was appointed to act with the local board of health for the city and county of St. John, with power to acquire an additional epidemic hospital at a cost not to exceed the sum of \$10,000. Subsequently the Morland Farm, on the Sandy Point road, was purchased, the con-veyance being made to the municipality for the sum of \$7,000, which sum was paid by the municipality. This property is now designated the "Isolation Hospital." 

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
