STRIKE OF COAL MINERS
MAY END BYSome Men Returned to Work in West Virginia
Union Mines are Running.—No Disorders Reported.

Washington, Nov. 4. — The belief prevails that the end of the coal strike is near.

There was nothing definite to justify this hopeful view of the situation, but everywhere influences are being brought to bear to have the strikers, numbering more than 400,000, return to work.

Confidential reports show many defections from the ranks of the strikers. Large numbers of idle miners had declared they wanted to return to work.

Scattered reports from the fields, reaching into 28 states, showed the first breaks in the ranks of organized labor in West Virginia and Colorado. All non-union mines are working to full capacity and turning out considerably more coal than on Saturday. Some of the operators' reports say that union men had gone to work in non-union mines. There is a growing sentiment that the men themselves

should have prevailed that the end of the strike is near.

The crisis, however, is not over. The strikers' representatives are making a last effort to make a special appeal to the strikers to return to work.

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BOARD OF COMMERCE
TO INVESTIGATE MILKFollowing Recent Increase By Producers to 15 Cents
Council Passed Resolution

A SHORT SESSION OF THAT

The city council last evening decided to request the Board of Commerce to investigate the price of milk in the city following the recent advance in the price. A motion to send a resolution to the board was made by Aldermen Bowman and Lippert which was unanimously carried.

Ald. Bowman in speaking on the motion referred to the letter which Mr. A. S. Shoemaker had in the Record several days ago on the milk prices.

This letter was as follows:

"The milk producers of this vicinity have formed an association and are asking practically the same price as Toronto producers are getting laid down in Toronto. In Toronto where the Board of Commerce fixed the price, milk is selling for 16 cents per quart or 13 pint tickets for \$1.00.

The milk for Toronto is shipped into the city from a radius of one hundred miles and the producer has to pay the freight. The vendors of Kitchener offered to pay Toronto price less freight and sell milk at fourteen cents a quart. This offer was not accepted by the producers, and notice given if the higher price was not guaranteed by Nov. 1st, the milk would be withheld.

The public can demand an investigation by the Board of Commerce as to the reason for this. It would be a wise course to take."

Mr. Shoemaker was present and he substantiated the statements made. Incidentally he recalled the fact that several months ago when the request to have milk bottled by grocers was up and when the council declined to act as requested the producers after the meeting showed signs of consternation and an increase in prices. The producers then said the Council had told them to mind their own business and that was what they were doing.

Mr. Shoemaker said that the recent advance in the price of milk had given the dealers only three days' time-in-fact of three weeks as required by agreement. The dealers, owing to the fact that so many babies are dependent on a regular supply of milk did not

\$1500 HOUSES
FOR THIS YEAR

UNDER THE ONTARIO HOUSING ACT.

Ontario, excluding the city of Toronto, will be about 1,500 houses the richer by the end of November through the season's activities of the Provincial Housing Commission. This is really a remarkable achievement when it is borne in mind that the municipalities which availed themselves of the housing scheme passed by the Legislature did not start building until last April, and that many of them could not begin work until about three months ago. The rural districts have certainly "got a move on."

Applications approved for loans number 1,500, and of this number approximately 600 were granted to returned soldiers. In over 500 of the latter cases the full cost of the house and land has been made with out any cash payment being required. Between 300 and 400 houses are in occupation, while every one of the remainder has a tenant-owner awaiting completion by the end of November.

93 Municipalities in it. Altogether 93 municipalities have come under the act, including 18

cities, 43 towns 18 villages and 14 townships, while about 10 other cities and towns contemplate following their example. This means that all the cities in the province, with the exception of two, will take advantage of the Provincial Housing Commission's scheme and practically all the towns.

Appropriations aggregating \$106,200 have been granted to 33 of the municipalities and 70 of them are actually building. The others are developing their schemes and will put them into effect next year.

Windsor Leads.
Windsor heads every place in the province with a building programme for 1919 of about 150 houses, while Hamilton, Oshawa and Niagara Falls are each constructing approximately 100 houses. Approximate figures for other municipalities are: Brantford, 30; New Toronto, 60; the 800, 60; Ford City, 30; London, 20; Ottawa, 50; Paris, 20; Port Colborne, 25; Sudbury, 20; York Township, 50; Iroquois Falls, 50; Hawkesbury, 25; Port Credit, 30. The whole of the houses at Port Credit are for returned soldiers.

4,000 Next Year.
"Next year," said J. A. Ellis, the director of the Provincial Housing Commission, "the municipalities contemplate erecting 4,000 houses at least. None of the other provinces with the exception of British Columbia, has yet started actual building, so that Ontario is again the first province in the Dominion."

Windsor has the most ambitious scheme for 1920, planning to put up between 600 and 700 houses. Ottawa has already mapped out a scheme for the construction of 300 houses in the spring, every one of which is already taken. Niagara Falls contemplates erecting 300, while Hamilton can easily do the same.

Hamilton's Methods.
Hamilton, perhaps, leads every place in the province in its methods of convenience to home-builders. The city has a complete list of all vacant land within its borders, and each piece has its price. Anybody seeking for land on which to erect a home calls at the office of the Housing Commission, and takes his choice from the list. If the site or the cost does not suit him he is at liberty to get a better bargain.

The general average cost of the houses being erected in the province runs between \$3,000 and \$4,000 each.

The annual public auction sale of live stock at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, was quite successful. Owing to the scarcity of houses in Guelph the Canadian Milk Products Co. will build some to accommodate their employees.
