### Death of Former Resident of This City.

### Favors Combined School For Brantford.

Principal A. M. Overholt of the Brantford Collegiate Institute, has presented an alternative plan for increased accommodation without the necessity of erecting a complete Technical School. He is of the belief that a combined school is to be preferred to two distinct institutions. He would add a wing to the present building, which would contain machine and workshop for the main industries of the city, household arts departments, including cooking, dress-making, millinery and laundry departments, with cafeteria for day students, and a community kitchen and dining-room for the public, an art room, draughting room and class rooms on the top flat to relieve certain rooms in the present building needed for other classes. Such would give the needed technical facilities and also relieve the pressure on the present building.

The laboratories would be available for both.

Mr. Overholt is a strong exponent of combined schools, rather than two separate ones as at present the other party, supporting a purely Technical School and the Collegiate separately, contending that they will work out better, and would be more economical.

### New Sheriff Of Grey.

Jas. Wilson of Hanover has been appointed Sheriff for the county of Grey to succeed the late Sheriff T. H. Thomson of Owen Sound, who died two weeks ago. Since the vacancy occurred the general understanding has been that Mr. Wilson would be the most probable of the many candidates for the position. There were numerous applications, including those of several returned men, but the feeling was that a man from the south part of the county should be appointed. The new Sheriff is a fine type of man and will fill the office well. He is a building contractor. He lost one son in the war, and another son also served overseas.

### Influenza Again

Influenza is again showing its presence in Oxford County. 3 deaths having been reported in Woodstock. Enquiries this morning revealed the fact that Kitchener and the immediate vicinity are without new cases up to the present although in Woodstock and district the fresh outbreak is causing no little concern.

### Science Master At Guelph.

Foster, who for several years past has been the manager of the Guelph Radial Railway, and also manager of the Guelph Waterworks Department, has received the appointment as manager of the Brantford Municipal Railway, and expects to leave to take up the duties of this important position in a few weeks' time.

## Guelph Company To Build Addition

### PARTRIDGE RUBBER CO. ADDING TO PLANT

Referring to proposed additions to one of Guelph's industries, the Guelph Herald says:

"Among the manufacturing establishments of Guelph which will build an extension to their factory during the coming year is that of P. E. Partridge Rubber Co. This firm has only been doing business in Guelph for a little more than two years, but such rapid strides have been made and the business has been increased to such an extent that it has been found absolutely necessary to provide greater accommodation at once. Plans have been prepared for the erection of a building as an addition to the present plant 100 feet long and three stories high, to be placed at the eastern end of the factory and extending almost to Metcalf street. It is expected that the work of construction on the new addition will begin as soon as the plans are finally approved of and the contract let. The new extension will be built much along the same lines as the present one, with the exception that more glass will be used in order that better light may be obtained. It will be up to date in every particular. When it is completed the Partridge Rubber Co. will be enabled to just about double their present capacity, which means that fully 750 people will be given employment, there being almost 400 now working at the plant, three shifts being used and the plant being operated 24 hours a day. This has been found necessary in order to keep up with the rapidly increasing business being done by this firm.

Mr. Partridge, the president of the company, informed The Herald that the business of the Partridge Rubber Co. last year totalled \$1,250,000, and that over \$300,000 had been paid out in wages. Every month's business shows an increase over that of the month previous, and he expects that during 1919 the company will do a business amounting to \$2,500,000. In order to do this the capacity must be increased and more people employed. He also stated that whenever possible returned soldiers who could do the work would be given every chance to make good and adequate wages would be paid to these men. Good tire builders earn anywhere from \$6 to \$12 per day, according to their ability. It might be mentioned that when the business was taken over by the Partridge Rubber Co. there were about 20 men employed in the whole building, and a visit to the factory now shows that it is a busy hive of industry, under capable business management and first class roads being turned out.

Mr. Partridge is exceedingly optimistic regarding the future of the rubber business in Canada. He says it is bound to grow and he firm who keeps abreast of the times and manufactures the kind of goods the public want cannot help but succeed.

In order that there may be no misunderstanding in the matter it should be pointed out that in erecting this new extension to the present factory the Partridge Rubber Co. is not asking for any concessions from the city whatever as the business is now able to stand on its own feet.

The other new building which it is proposed to erect and for which certain concessions are being asked from the city is a rubber footwear factory with a capacity of 5000 pairs a day. It is proposed to erect a modern factory on the property formerly used as a lime kiln and facing Metcalf street. It is to be 200x300 feet in size four stories in height and to be modern in every particular. Further particulars of this proposition will be given to the public later.
