THE GLEANER.

It took seven tons and a half of paper to print The Gleaner's issue of Saturday. Three delivery wagons were kept actively at work from four o'clock until six-thirty serving the outgoing accommodation and express trains and the city agents which have The Gleaner on sale; and in the department in which the papers are addressed and wrapped for the outgoing mails a staff of twelve people was required to hustle at high speed until ten minutes past six, to complete its work.

THE ROYAL BANK OF CANADA.

The annual statement of the Royal Bank of Canada is sure to attract more than usual interest, as it is the first published since the Royal took over the Traders' Bank. Owing to the change in the fiscal year of the Royal Bank, the statement is only for eleven months ending November 30th, 1912.

Total deposits now stand at \$137,891,667, showing large increases over the combined figures of the Royal and Traders' at the end of last year. The net profits for the eleven months ending November 30th, 1912, after deducting charges of management, accrued interest on deposits, full provision for all bad and doubtful debts, rebate of interest on unstarved bills and general bonuses granted to the staff, amounted to \$1,537,324.77, being at the rate of 19.19 per cent. on the average paid-up capital of \$7,930,756.

PANAMA CANAL TOLLS.

It is gratifying to note that a disposition seems to exist at Washington to admit the force of the representation of the British foreign minister, Sir Edward Grey, regarding discriminatory tolls in the Panama canal, and to agree to arbitration.

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sometimes considerable honest public opinion in the United States has failed to influence materially the politicians at Washington; and the intimation is welcome that now in the Panama matter even the politicians are conceding something.

Much reason exists to hope that Congress will agree to arbitrate. Otherwise a condition will be established unfair to Canada, unfair to Britain, unfair to the world, and grossly injurious to the cause of international good faith and of arbitration.

CANADA AND THE NAVY.

Several weeks ago while Mr. Borden was still in London, a group of men belonging to both political parties got together in Winnipeg with a view to forwarding the movement for adequate Canadian participation in sea defence. The idea of concerted action spread to Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and other centres.

There was no secret about the memorial in its last stages, says the Toronto News. It was first given publicity by a Liberal newspaper at Ottawa and was afterwards widely copied by the press throughout the country.

Another clause expressed the view that we should do our part to "demonstrate unmistakably the strength of the overseas resources which are available for the defence of the Empire." The memorial frankly recognized the two phases of the problem, the question of an immediate crisis and that of a permanent defence policy.

DR. SHEA'S PARDON BEING DISCUSSED

District Attorney's Statement Regarding Pardoning of a Former Woodstock Man.

Boston, Dec. 16—Dist. Atty. Pelletier has given out a statement on the pardon of Dr. Shea by Gov. Foss and the Executive Council, in which he said he knew nothing of a hearing on the case until the day of the pardon, and added:

"When a pardon is sought on any grounds other than 'innocence,' I feel that the reasons are peculiarly within the province of the pardoning authorities. In cases when a wrongful conviction is claimed, the Governor and Council are called upon to retry the case and override the verdict of a jury and the opinion of a judge who has permitted the verdict to stand."
