IX. Duties of the Chief Superintendent of Schools.

Chief superintendent of schools appointed. His salary. To account for the contingent expenses of his office. To be allowed two clerks; salary of each.

XXXIV. And be it enacted, That the Governor may, from time 2 to time, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the Province, appoint a fit and proper person to be Chief Superintendent of Schools for Upper Canada, who shall hold his office during pleasure, and shall receive a salary of pounds ner annum; and shall be responsible to and subject to the direction of the Governor-General communicated to him through such Department of 8 Her Majesty's Provincial Government, as by the Governor may be directed in that behalf; and shall account for the contingent 10 expenses of his office, as provided in respect of other public offices; and shall be allowed two Clerks, the first of whom to 12 receive pounds per annum, and the second pounds per annum, to 14 commence from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and 16

Duties of the chief superintendent.
To apportion all moneys granted by the legislature for the support of common schools, and in what ratio.

XXXV. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Chief Superintendent of Schools:

Firstly. To apportion annually, on or before the first day of May, 20 all monies granted or provided by the Legislature for the support of Common Schools in Upper Canada, and not otherwise appropriated by this Act, to the several Counties, Townships, Cities, Towns and incorporated Villages therein, according to the ratio of population in each as compared with the whole population of Upper Canada; or when the census or returns upon which such an apportionment is to be made, shall be so far defective, in respect to any County, Township, City, Town or Village, as to render it impracticable for the Chief Superintendent to ascertain from such data the share of school moneys which ought then to be apportioned to such County, Township, City, Town or Village, he shall ascertain, by the best evidence in his power, the facts upon which the ratio of such apportionment can be most fairly and equitably made, and make it accordingly.

To certify such apportionment to the Inspector General, and county clerks. Secondly. To certify each apportionment made by him to the Inspector-General, so far as it relates to the several Counties, Cities, 34 Towns and incorporated Villages in Upper Canada, and to give immediate notice thereof to the Clerk of each County, City, Town 36 and Village interested therein, stating the time when the amount of monies thus apportioned, will be payable to the Treasurer of such 38 County, City, Town or Village.

To prepare suitable forms, &c., for executing the law, and transmit to local school officers.

Thirdly. To prepare suitable forms, and give such instructions as 40 he shall judge necessary and proper, for making all reports and conducting all proceedings under this Act, and to cause the same with 42 such general regulations as shall be approved of by the Council of Public Instruction, for the better organization and government of 44 Common Schools, to be transmitted to the officers required to execute the provisions of this Act.

To cause copies of the school law, regulations, &c., to be printed and distributed as occasion may require.

Fourthly. To cause to be printed, from time to time, in a convenient form, so many copies of this Act, with the necessary forms, instruct 48 tions, and regulations to be observed in executing its provisions, as he may deem sufficient for the information of all officers of Common og Schools, and to cause the same to be distributed for that purpose.
