- (a) a person born in any part of South Africa included in the Union, who is not an alien or a prohibited immigrant, ("alien" meaning a person who is not a British subject).
- (b) a British subject whose entry has not been prohibited under any immigration law in force in any part of South Africa now included in the Union, and who has been continuously domiciled in the Union for two years after entry, so long as he retains such domicile;
- (c) a person domiciled in the Union, who is not a prohibited immigrant, who became a naturalized British subject under the laws in force in any part of South Africa now included in the Union, and who has been continuously domiciled in the Union for at least three years after entry, so long as he retains that domicile and does not become an alien;
- (d) a person born outside any part of South
 Africa included in the Union, whose father
 was a Union national at the time of such
 person's birth, or would have been a Union
 national if the Act had at the time of such
 person's birth been in force, and was not
 in the service of an enemy state, provided
 such person is not a prohibited immigrant.
 (South West Africa is included in the Union).
