NINETEEN DEAD.

Dozen Slightly Injured Is Casualty List of 20th Century Wreck.

Cleveland, June 23.—Nineteen dead and a dozen slightly injured last night comprised the revised casualty list made by the wrecking Wednesday might at Mentor. Onlo, of the easibound 20th Century Limited, the Lake Shore Railroad's 13-hour train, which ran into an open switch, crushed the Mentor Depot and partly burned it up, scorching several of the mangled corpses.
