A sad drowning accident took place in the Bay of Quinte at Belleville last week. At Massawassa Point, Miss Gladys Bongard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Bongard, and granddaughter of Allan McFee, Esq., was drowned while in bathing. A companion, Miss Doris Vermilyea, was with her. The girls were playing in the water near the end of the point towards the hotel and accidentally stepped off the shoal into a deep excavation which had been made by a government dredge for the purpose of aiding navigation. Miss Vermilyea was rescued in an unconscious condition, but was revived by artificial respiration. Miss Bongard was not recovered until fifteen minutes after she went down and although every effort was made it was impossible to revive her. It is a particularly sad case. Miss Bongard had just passed the entrance examinations and was looking forward with high hope to the coming new scholastic life. She was a bright, sparkling girl, a universal favorite and she will be missed in the circle she graced with her activities.

IN COURT
