HIGHWAY ENGINEER FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Fredrickton, Sept. 2.—The Provincial Government ended its session here this afternoon, routine business forming the major part of the day's work. The sum of \$25,000 was voted to the patriotic fund.

News in Brief

Pittsburg, Sept. 1.—Harry K. Thaw, through his attorneys, this afternoon filed a petition in the common pleas court, asking a divorce from his wife, Evelyn Nesbit, charging with misconduct with John Francis, of New York.

Madrid, September 2.—The German Government has paid to the Spanish Government, through its ambassador at Madrid, 240,000 pesetas (\$48,000) in demerit for the deaths of seven Spaniards who were shot in August, 1914.

Halifax, Sept. 1.—A rowboat containing two men-of-war sailors and two women capsized in the harbor off the city, near the wharf of the Maritime Hotel, H. M. S. "..." was drowned. The others were rescued by a launch from a war-ship.

San Francisco, Sept. 3.—Five million dollars have been subscribed by a group of citizens for the purchase of a ship in the Orient to finance a steamship line to be operated by the Japanese.

Paris, Sept. 4.—Adjutant Berin, of the French Aviation Corps, has been cited in the orders of the day and awarded the Croix de Guerre for his gallantry in bringing back in safety Adjutant Boyer, whose plane was disabled by his machine as the result of an accident.

Winnipeg, Sept. 4.—Argument is being heard to-day by Magistrate F. H. Macdonald in the case of Sir Rodmond Roblin, Howden, Montague and Colwell to secure the Crown more particulars as to the charges against them, which do not specify any details, but merely allege "conspiracy to defraud."

Ossining, N. Y., Sept. 3.—Five murderers were put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison to-day inside of the prison walls.

Paris, Aug. 31.—It is reported that Adolphe Pegoud, the famous French aviator, has been killed.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—A \$50,000 fire early to-day destroyed the grandstand at the Blue Bonnets race track, but the occurrence will not affect the fall meet which opens to-morrow.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 2.—The question of the proposed railway through the leading issue to-day in Newfoundland politics. Advocates for and against temperance have completed plans for launching a campaign.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—The outcome of a grave treasonable conspiracy against the State is today announced by the General Staff. Four men have already been dealt with. Of their accomplices, Otto never David, Fredberg, Robert Falk, and Mateouch Mikoules were sentenced by Court-martial to be hanged. This sentence was carried out on the night of the 7th inst.

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Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 2.—A heavy thunder and hail storm passed over here early this morning. The rain, hail and hail-drops were very heavy and in business circles there was a great deal of damage done by the storm.

Washington, Aug. 31.—The Pan-American peace appeal now has been delivered to all military and political leaders in Mexico. The remaining remnants have just been reached by courier, and to give them time for reply they were held up by a meeting of the Pan-American conference until next week.

General Carranza's reply still is lacking, but it has been authoritatively declared that the conference will proceed, irrespective of this attitude.

Five Big Rooms, Well Arranged

On the first floor the large living room extends clear across the front of the house, although at the left an one enters there is a stair landing, and at the right a large fireplace, flanked by built-in book-cases. The dining room is arranged with a beamed ceiling and with twin buffets in the rear corners of the room, with a window seat under the centre casement window, looking out upon the back garden.

On the second floor there are two bedrooms with large storage closets and the bathroom. The basement is divided lengthwise through the centre, the first room, into which the stairs descend from the kitchen, being used for laundry purposes and the storage of vegetables, from which a door opens into a furnace room, with a separate room partitioned off at the rear for fuel storage. The ash chute from the living room fireplace comes down into the furnace room.
