London Chronicle Although women can practice as barristers in Norway, the government of that country will not allow them to preach. Three years ago Miss Anna Shaw, an ordained minister of the Baptist church, visited Christiania as a delegate to the Women's International Convention, and it was expected that she would deliver a sermon during her stay there. The Minister of Public Worship however prohibited her from doing so, basing his prohibition on the Norwegian law which makes women ineligible for office in the army, the navy or the church. An appeal from this decision was made to the Council of Ministers of State. By a vote of four to three they decided adversely to Miss Shaw, but she had the satisfaction, as she says, of knowing that the Premier voted in her favor.

NOTED LECTURER AT THE GRAND OPERA HOUSE ON SUNDAY

"FUTURE LIFE OF MEN AND NATIONS" will be the subject of Hon. J. F. Rutherford's lecture at the Grand Opera House Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Mr. Rutherford is noted in America and Europe as a Bible lecturer of unusual ability and force. He is an active lawyer, Member of the New York City Bar. He gives his spare time to delivering lectures on Historical, Scientific and Biblical subjects, particularly relating to man, his origin, his course and his future destiny. His arguments are based upon the Bible, are clear, convincing and pleasing. Judge Rutherford declines to accept money for his Bible lectures, hence admission to the Grand Opera House will be entirely free, and no collections will be received.

It is a noticeable fact that all over the civilized world the people are awakening to the study of the Bible, particularly laymen, and all the great truths therein, are being brought to bear upon questions relating to the times in which we are living and the future welfare of mankind and the nations of earth. It is rather unusual for a lawyer to give time and thought to the Biblical side of these great questions, but Judge Rutherford holds that the Bible contains the solution for the perplexing problems of our time. After giving the subject deep and careful consideration, he is giving the public the benefit of his research and personal investigation free of charge. He has traveled extensively in the Orient, Egypt, the Holy Land and Europe, studying conditions. Public press reports are to the effect that Judge Rutherford is a powerful speaker and that his lectures are exceedingly instructive and helpful. Nearly every one is interested in the future of man, because they have some loved one who has died and gone before. The future of nations necessarily depends upon the future of men, hence closely allied are the questions.

Much interest is being shown in this coming lecture. No seats will be reserved, but those going first will have the choice seats. His Worship Mayor Spence will preside at the meeting and introduce the speaker. Some appropriate music has been arranged for the occasion. We are pleased to announce the coming of this well and favorably known lecturer to our city.

They will enjoy a tour through the big city and they will visit other resorts, finally coming to Brantford to be united in Grace Church. They will take up their residence on Cayuga street when Stanley returns to duty on the 25th, inst.

Frost Came on While Sap Was in Top of Trees—Other Crops Fair.

There will be few peaches this year. This was the sad news conveyed by a large dealer this morning. "The crop will be only five per cent of what it was last year," he said.

"Had last year's bumper crop any tendency to do with it" he was asked. "No, but it was the warm weather in November and December advancing the formation of the buds on the branches, and when the extreme cold weather came in the latter part of January and February the sap was still in the top of the trees instead of being down in the roots where it should have been. The trees would have been all right had the cold weather come on gradually."

"What about the other crops?" "Some of the fruit growers having large peach orchards are trying to turn their hand to raising some other crop, but find it difficult on account of the rain, especially on low-lying land, but some are not in a position to grow anything else, and the loss to the growers in the Niagara peninsula cannot be fully estimated. The loss to the growers is estimated at from 1 0 to 15 millions."

Niagara District

I have covered the ground from Stoney Creek, thru Winona, Grimsby, Beamsville, Jordan, Port Dalhousie, St. Catharines, Niagara, Queenstown, St. David's and Stamford to Niagara Falls. Five per cent will be the acreage crop. Some orchards may have 10 per cent, but others will yield only one or two per cent.

"Cherries will make a good showing and pears will be fair, also pears. Small fruits are all fairly good, while strawberries and raspberries have good prospects."
