London, April 10. - Britons are now beginning, though reluctantly, to realize that Lord Roberts is in for a winter campaign; lasting several months. This is the end in a few words of the high hopes based on Lord Roberts' brilliant dash to Kimberiey and Bloemfontein.

Preparations are being made to hold Bloemfontein against surprises. Lord Kitchener has been given an important duty, being responsible for the protection of the railway, while Lord herts is waiting for remounts and winter clothing for the troops, whose thin cotton khaki uniforms and boots are worn out. Gen. Brabant and Gen. Gatacre are both at a standstill. Lord Roberts will probably for some time confine his operations to clearing the Free State behind him of raiders and also to relieving Mafeking, for which purpose apparently the 8th division, now arriving at Cape Town, has been ordered to Kimberley.
