A RECORD TOUR

The Black Watch Band Will Traverse over 12,000 Miles.

The tour of the famous Black Watch Band and Pipe Bands of Canada, beginning next month, makes a new record for long distance traveling by musical organizations in a brief time. The Bands in charge of Major Bass will leave Edinburgh for the west and sail from Liverpool on August 19th. After arrival in Montreal they will go direct to Toronto, where they play for two weeks at the Canadian National Exposition, after which they go on tour under the direction of Mr. Stewart Houston. The first week will be devoted to Western Ontario; the places visited being Windsor, Chatham, London, Stratford, Galt, Guelph, Brantford, Hamilton, Niagara Falls. On Saturday night, Sept. 17th, they leave for the Northwest, playing at Fort William, Winnipeg, Brandon, Portage la Prairie and Rat Portage. For the third week they will be in Toronto, Lindsay, Peterboro, Belleville, Kingston, Brockville, Ottawa and Montreal. For the last week the Highlanders will be in St. John, Halifax, New Glasgow, Sydney, Amherst, Moncton, leaving the last named city on Saturday evening, Oct. 8th, and sailing from Rimouski the following morning.

On the tour the Band will have traversed, including their ocean passages, over 12,000 miles. In order to accomplish the distance they will travel by special train, on special sleeping cars. The party will number over sixty.

THEY GOT THEIRS

Two ranks of Chatham bowlers went to Thamesville and defeat yesterday and they had the defeat handed out to them in large cold chucks. R. J. Fleming says that the best "wink" he got once in a while and this was either once or the while. He also says that the Thamesville livers are very peculiar. ## BETTER THAN A VICTORY

Ozar Says He Can Now Face the Future Calmly.

Believes the Birth of His Son Is a "Sign That the War Will Be Brought to a Happy Conclusion"—Quaint Russian Ceremonial at the Coming of An Heir—Mother and Boy Progressing Satisfactorily.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—(4 a. m.)—This morning the Emperor and the heir to the throne are both making satisfactory progress.

An Imperial manifesto invites all Russian subjects to offer their prayers for the prosperity of the heir to the throne. In receiving congratulations yesterday, the Emperor in a brief reply said:

"I am happier at the birth of a son and heir than at a victory of my troops, for now I face the future calmly and without alarm, knowing by this sign that the war will be brought to a happy conclusion."

HEIR TO RUSSIAN THRONE.

Ray of Sunshine Pierces the Gloom at Peterhof.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—A son and heir to the Russian throne has been born. The Empress and the child are doing well. The birth occurred at 12:30 p. m. yesterday. The child will be christened Alexis.

The birth so greatly wished for, that of an heir to the Russian crown, occurred in the Alexandra Villa, one of a group of four small palaces in a secluded corner of the magnificent Peterhof Park. In one of these buildings the Empress has been living for weeks. The other three are occupied by members of the Imperial family, gathered there in expectation of yesterday's event.

The birth of the heir to the throne was attended by all the ceremonial ordained by Imperial tradition. In accordance with the Russian law there were present, besides the Emperor, Baron Frederik, the master of the ceremonies, and Prince Dolgorouky, the grand marshal of the court. Dr. Rott, the Emperor's family physician, was the accoucheur, and Dr. Hiruch was the surgeon in attendance.

Dr. Rott personally announced the birth of the heir to the awaiting Imperial family. A formal announcement will be published in The Official Messenger. An Imperial salute of 101 guns was subsequently fired, first from Peterhof, and it was then repeated by all the forts around St. Petersburg.

The christening of the heir will occur in a fortnight. It will be a ceremony of the most elaborate sort. In accordance with Russian Imperial custom it will be performed in the Imperial chapel of the Peterhof Palace.

May Mean a Constitution.

Berlin, Aug. 13.—The Kleine Journal says it expects that the birth of an heir to the Russian throne will be followed in a few days by the proclamation of a constitution, claiming to have been informed that Emperor Nicholas vowed he would give a constitution to Russia if the Empress gave birth to a son.

NOT A PERMANENT STAY.

Britain to Vacate Lhasa, But to Demand Respectful Treatment.

London, Aug. 13.—In the House of Commons yesterday, during the discussion of the India budget, Indian Secretary Brodrick, replying to criticisms of the Tibet expedition, said he was unable to say when it would return.

It was the intention to vacate Lhasa immediately after terms had been arranged. The Government did not propose a permanent occupation, but it must not be understood that Great Britain's name would be treated with proper respect.

The Secretary added that Russia had been fully advised and agreed with Great Britain's plans.

Unique Quakers in Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 13.—About 1,500 people attended the formal public welcome of the Friends' General Conference, held for the first time in Canada, at Massey Hall last night.

Dr. Janney of Baltimore, one of the prominent addresses of welcome for the city by Mr. S. Alfred Jones, Acting-Mayor, and Hon. G. W. Ross for the Province and Canada, were both efforts in this direction, and were as unique in this respect as the visitors from the South and from England. The feature of the evening was an address on "The Friend and His Message" by Principal Graham of Dalton Hall, Manchester, England, who prefaced his address with the remark that he could not avoid replying to the words of the Premier, "No word brought the heart to the throat and the moisture to the eyes of Englishmen like a reference to their countrymen overseas, who helped to preserve that British peace under which to-day dwell one-fourth of the human race. The sessions continue three times daily until Thursday night of next week.

Britain Protest.

Tangier, Aug. 13.—Hamet Jaia, principal secretary to El Moushbi, the Moroccan Minister of War, has been arrested and imprisoned here and his goods confiscated under the orders of the Sultan. Jaia is a British subject, and the European residents are indignant at his arrest. The British Legation has strongly protested to the Moroccan Government, but so far the protest has been entirely ignored.

Ministry Defeated.

London, Aug. 13.—(C. A. P.)—The Australian Commonwealth Ministry was defeated by 86 votes to 84 on a motion for re-appointment of the clause of the Arbitration Bill granting a preference to trade unionists.
