MODERN MANNERS.

Dr. Hodgins Reflects on Lack of Culture in Canadian Life.

In Dr. J. G. Hodgins' opinion Canadian manners in both public men and children are deteriorating. The Doctor ought to know. He has been in the Civil Service sixty years,

and a man should be a judge of civility in that time.

This venerable educationist is 83 years old. He was born in Dublin, came to Canada in '53, and has been hers ever since. He was for 32 years the close friend and deputy of Dr. Rverson, whose portrait done in oil Ryerson, whose portrait done in oil hangs in the library at 92 Pembroke street. Perhaps in all Toronto there is not so picturesque a patriarch of snowy hair and whiskers as Dr. Hodgins. He is still alert and active, and every morning as he has done

gins. He is still alert and active, and every morning, as he has done for 60 years, goes down to the Education Department.

Dr. Hodgins may be called the Father of the Education Department, for it was built on the Irish model, which he went to Dublin to study in 1845. He is best known to the public as the main author of Dr. Ryerson's "Story of My Life," of which Dr. Ryerson himself wrote but 60 pages. He is now engaged on docupages. He is now engaged on docu-mentary history of education in Can-

ida.
"Was Dr. Ryerson an autocrat?"

was Dr. Ryerson an autocrat?" asked the reporter.

"Far from it," was the reply. "He was exceedingly humble-minded in his search for truth. But he was not a man of detail. He stood in the watch-tower and looked ahead. The rest of us worked out the particulars."

"You must have known most of the public men for two generations in Canada?" observed the reporter. "All of them," he replied. "I well knew Lord Elgin, in 1848. He help-All of them, he replied. "I well knew Lord Elgin, in 1848. He helped us immensely in our struggle for free schools. He was after the Scotch parochial model. He made a beautiful speech at the laying of the corner-stone of the Education Department. The motto on his coat-of-arms was simply "Fuimus"—meaning that his ancestors were Kings, for he was descended from the Bruces. He was an ideal man of affairs and a man of wonderful courtesy."

"How do the public men of to-day compare with the former ones?" asked the reporter.

"Unfavorably. There is less chivalry and courtesy. I am afraid that begins in the schools, as well as in the home. In 1871 I drew up a series of twenty moral lessons, including such subjects as "reverence to superiors" which the texterner.

ing such subjects as "reverence to superiors," which the teachers read and discussed on each Friday afternoon, which was made a sort of dies non. 
