A SILLY QUARREL

Strife Said to be Caused Between Detroit and Chatham Over Aid to Bereaved Woman

THE SUICIDE OF ASSASSIN

Morales Recognized at Torreon de Ardos, Shot Himself

THREW BOMB AT KING

Madrid, June 4.—The capture and suicide Saturday night at Torreon de Ardos of Manuel Morales, the chief suspect in the bomb outrage against King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, adds another dramatic chapter to the incidents surrounding the royal wedding. Morales was recognized in the little town of Torreon de Ardos, midway between Madrid and Alcalá, a guard sought to detain him, but Morales, drawing a revolver, shot the guard dead. Then he turned to flee, but a number of the inhabitants of the town were upon him, and turning the revolver upon himself he sent a shot in the region of his heart, expiring a few minutes later.

Senor Cuesta, the proprietor of the hotel, from the balcony of which Morales threw the bomb, viewed the body yesterday morning and completely identified it as that of his recent guest.

A close examination of the dead man showed that there were three abrasions on the body besides the death wound—one on the hand, one under the left eye, and one on the forehead.

The final disposition of the body of Morales has not yet been determined on, but the public demand an ignominious burial.

Alfonso's Predictions.

The American envoy to the royal wedding, Frederick W. Whittier, had a brief conversation with King Alfonso during the reception at the palace Saturday night. When the conversation naturally turned to the attempt on the King and Queen, King Alfonso shrugged his shoulders and made the following significant statement, showing how he views the future: "Yes, unfortunately it was unsuccessful, but it will come again. It may be any time—perhaps to-morrow, perhaps within a month, perhaps within a year—but it will come."

The face of the King wore a look of calm resignation as he gave this forecast of the future. Although he bore himself splendidly throughout the terrible experience, the courtiers witnessed a trying scene as King Alfonso and Queen Victoria hurried within the castle after the attempt was made to assassinate them. For a moment Alfonso's nerves were completely unstrung, and turning to Queen Victoria, her dress spattered with blood, he exclaimed: "Why did I bring you to this country? It was wrong; you never should have come here."

Then the queen-mother and one of the infantas calmed the overwrought nerves of the King and the bridal couple repaired sadly to the nuptial chamber.

The churches of Madrid yesterday celebrated masses of thanksgiving for the escape of the King and Queen.

Driven From Home.

Barcelona, June 4.—Senor Morales, father of the anarchist who attempted to kill King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, and who committed suicide at Torreon de Ardos Saturday night, was seen at Barcelona yesterday. He is the proprietor of a prosperous factory there. He has a strong individuality and is highly respected.

Answering the questions of an inspector of police concerning his son, he said: "I wish to know nothing of this infamous creature formerly bearing my name. I have not considered him my son since I drove him from my house March 12." The reasons were purely domestic.

Englishman Is Released.

Madrid, June 4.—Robert Hamilton, the English bomb suspect, has been released. The British embassy vouched for him to have been a case of mistaken identity.

PEDRO JUMPED IN

Ernest Briscoe has a Narrow Escape From Drowning, but a Faithful Dog Helps Him Out.

While canoeing last night in the River Thames, Ernest Briscoe, of Briscoe Bros., had a narrow escape from drowning. His canoe upset in the middle of the river and Ernest was forced to swim ashore with all his clothes on. The accident occurred on the river just back of the Opera House, where Mr. Fred Briscoe, with his bull dog, Pedro, was watching the boats and launches as they passed up and down the river. As soon as Ernest's canoe capsized, this dog Pedro immediately jumped into the water, howling and barking, and made direct for the canoe. He leaped Ernest and saw he was swimming for land. The dog then turned and got Ernest's hat, which had fallen in the water, and swam ashore, keeping along beside him all the way.

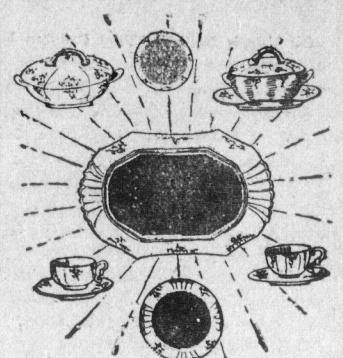
