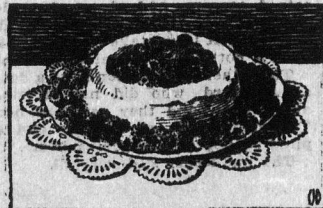
She paused, almost in triumph; the young people waited for her to answer her own question.
