The Chute and Putnam Families.

A history of the Chute family in England and America is about to be published by the Salem Press Publishing and Printing Co. of Salem, Mass. The work is compiled by Wm. E. Chute, formerly of Nova Scotia, who has put nearly 30 years work into it. Not only is the record given of the main lines of Chutes, but also the collateral lines, including many well known Canadian families.

This company are also publishing a history of the Putnam family in England and America, in parts. The history covers eight centuries of the life of this honored family. Particular attention has been paid to the life and service of Hon. James Putnam, who was a member of the Council of New Brunswick previous to 1786, and who was much interested in the development of that province. Many of his letters, which are printed, are in the possession of the writer of the history, Mr Eben Putnam, of Danvers, Mass., whose ancestor was a brother of Hon. James Putnam. The work is profusely illustrated, and has received complimentary notices from the American and English press. Both of these books are published by subscription, and the editions are limited. Big Fire at Yarmouth.

Yarmouth celebrated Dominion Day by having a \$50,000 bonfire. The conflagration started about 10.30 a. m. in the drying room of the Kinney-Haley Manufacturing Co.'s establishment, a great pile of wooden buildings, including steam planing mills, woodware factory, lumber yards and general building supplies' warehouses covering a large tract of ground, and extending out over the wharves. In a very short time the whole building was a perfect furnace. George Allen's cooperage and steam barrel factory to the north went next and the fire also spread south and swept down the Chute Hall Organ Company's factory. The flames crossed the lane leading down to Parker, Evans & Co.'s south end wharf, caught Mrs Terrence Keeman's house and then spread down the wharf, sweeping off all the fishing flukes, a long line of stores and the wharf itself, besides the schooner Joe Kinney, which was lying at the wharf. Next north was a huge pile of wooden buildings known as the Crosby mill, used as a cooperage, a lumber store, Crawley's boat shop and steam planing mill and a tenement house. All went down, as well as the wharf in the rear.

On the upper side of Water street the fire caught the coal sheds of the Kinney-Haley Co., their glass store, lumber store and lumber piles, sweeping them all down, and continued on among the little dwelling houses, which went down like paste-board. The loss will probably reach \$50,000, and the insurance was less than \$20,000. The dwellings destroyed were all occupied by poor people, and the destruction of the mills will not only throw a large number of people out of employment, but will seriously retard extensive building operations in Yarmouth, and throughout the western counties.
