### GASPEREAU FOWER FOR WINDSOR

CASPEREAU FOWER FOR WINDSOR

The Avon River Power Co. is carrying on work at Avon Falls. Hants county, for the purpose of supplying electricity from their hydro plant there for Windsor and all surrounding districts. W. H. Chase, of Wolfville, is the President of the Company and R. A. Jodrey, Wolfville, is general manager. The work is proceeding apace in the erection of dame and installation later of machinery. This is hoped to be completed early in the new year.

Windsor is now supplied with the electric current from the Gaspereau Power Plant at White Rock. The Avon River Power Co. has constructed a power line from Wolfville to Windsor to supply that town with electricity until the current can be obtained from Avon Falls. The Windsor Electric Light Co. which distributes the current to the town of Windsor has leased this power line connecting their town and Wolfville and are bringing their electric energy from the latter town, also for Hantsport and other intervening places.

When the power is turned on from Avon Palls there will be two sources of current available for any of the towns in the Valley. In case of any failure of one plant the current can be obtained from the other.
