### New Brunswick Apple Show

The second annual provincial apple show which will be held in the St. Andrew's Rink, St. John, will be formally opened by Premier Hazen, Hon. Dr. Landry and others at 8 p. m. Monday, Oct. 30th, and will run for the following three days. The apple crop is exceptionally good this year in the province and a marked improvement in quality over last year's exhibits is assured. Upwards of \$800.00 is being offered in prizes. Several new features will also be introduced, the aim of the management being to place before St. John and the fruit growers of New Brunswick a display of apples, hitherto unsurpassed in Canada. Leading authorities on apple culture from Ontario to Nova Scotia have been engaged to judge the exhibits and deliver addresses. Return tickets, from any point on the Canadian Pacific and Intercolonial railways will be issued on Standard Certificate plan, for single fare. ### Centreville News

The Fair a Success—R. R. Matters.

The Centreville two days' fair was held Oct. 4 and 5. The weather was very disagreeable Wednesday and it rained all day and nobody was in attendance except the exhibitors. Thursday was cold and very windy, still the attendance was very fair. The exhibit was good. Roots and vegetables were there in abundance, also apples.

The horse show was the principal attraction for many and was a credit to any section of country. Farmers are gradually beginning to raise pure bred stock.

The exhibit of poultry was large and a complete line of various breeds was shown. The Hartland Poultry Yards took the majority of prizes, but in some instances were beaten by our local poultry fanciers.

The exhibits of sheep, swine and cattle were not up to the average, while very creditable. The farmers are paying more attention to potatoes and less to cattle than formerly. Altogether, the exhibit was a little better than former years, and if the weather had been favorable a record crowd would have been in attendance.

On Friday evening Hon. J. K. Fleming and Mr. Gould had a long conference at Burt's hotel. Some of the local Conservatives now state that the valley road will be built according to the first proposition from Grand Falls to St. John, with I. C. R. operation. Mr. Gould stated at the hotel that inside of a year an electric road would be built from here to Presque Isle. This would tap the valley road here, and ought to be a paying proposition. If all these reports are true, Centreville will be the hub of the province.

### Mrs. Henry Doucett

The sudden death of Mrs. Henry Doucett of Knowlesville occurred at her home Sunday evening Oct. 1st.

Although Mrs. Doucett had been in failing health for some time her death was quite unexpected and came as sad news to the public.
