THE WAR.

it is commonly assumed that the allied powers are about to inaugurate a general offensive against the German lines on all fronts. The assumption is based upon the events of the last week or so, and the continuous bombardment of the German trenches by French and British artillery. There was first of all the visit of Lord Kitchener to France, his meeting with General Joffre and the French and British headquarters staff. Now General Joffre has paid a visit to the Italian lines, and it is assumed that the offensive when it does begin will include west and southern fronts. That it will begin soon is augured from the fact of the heavy and continuous bombardment of the German trenches these last few days. 'The British fleet co-operated with the field artillery in this bombardment, and this strengthens the presumption that a general infantry attack is to be made. These circumstances all fit in with each other, and there are other considerations which help to reduce the assumption to intelligent anticipation. The first of these is that the time appears favorable and the situation demands it. The German drive in Russia has slowed down and now is the time to strike back. Moreover an offensive on the west front has been awaited all summer, and the summer is rapidly passing. It is reasonable to conclude 'therefore that if any advance in force is to be attempted it must be made soon, while conditions are favor-Whether the assumption right or not will speedily be made apparent.

GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS.

The most significant item of war news of the last few weeks is the announcement from Petrograd that the Grand Duke Nicholas has been withdrawn from the chief Russian command. We can only guess at the reasons which have led to his supersession. Up to the beginning of May the Grand Duke had been generally successful in his command, and was generally credited with having proved himself one of the ablest tacticians of the war. He smashed the Austrians at a blow, and rolled back the tides of German invasion. Then came the great Teuton drive by which the Russian armies were driven back mile after mile, until the best part of Poland has been lost, with its great fortresses and populous cities. It looks as though the Grand Duke is
