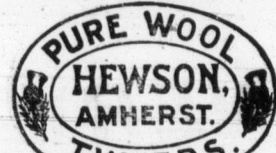

CHILDREN PERISH IN STORM WHICH SWEEPED THE COUNTRY

No Trace Can Be Discovered of Two Little Girls on Their Way Home From School Near Moncton—Fears Entertained as to Safety of Other Children in Country Districts—Telephone Lines Broken Down and Railway Service Disorganized.

Moncton, N.B., March 20.—"Nothing like it ever known within the history of the oldest inhabitant," is the general verdict in reference to the storm which has been sweeping the city since early morning. The big wind, which set in about 12 o'clock last night was considered to be about the worst experienced in this section for years, but it increased in fury this afternoon and closed off all communications to any storm within recollection of the most retentive memory.

Conditions tonight are alarming, and it is feared that tomorrow will bring tidings of loss of life in country districts. At 9 o'clock this evening it is impossible for citizens to be abroad without danger of perishing.

Two Children Reported Perished.

A report comes from Irish Town road that two children of John Keenan, of the I. C. R. offices, were lost in the storm on their way from school. It is impossible to verify or contradict the report. All the telephone wires in that direction are down and men and teams could make no headway against the storm, which seems to be increasing in violence. Mr. Keenan lives nearly a mile from the Humphrey school and the rumor is that the children failed to reach home, and search for them failed to find them. It is hoped that the report will turn out to be untrue.

The names of the children are Lotie and Annie, aged six and eight years. The school held one session the children starting for home about 1 o'clock, with the storm at its height. They were seen by neighbors a short distance on the road, but they failed to show up at home.

Mr. Keenan was telephoned to at

Moncton but was unable to reach home. He telephoned back appealing to neighbors to send out teams, but up to 9 tonight he had no tidings concerning the lost children and fears they have perished. He is still in the city, unable to reach home.

The train on which were J. C. R. employees and others living in Sunny Brae and vicinity were unable to leave Moncton this evening. So far as can be learned the Keenan children are the only ones lost in the storm in this vicinity, but it is more than likely that a similar fate has overtaken school children in more remote parts of the country. The Moncton school very wisely only held one session, as many of the younger children would have had to remain in the school buildings all night.

Roof Blows in, Many Hurt.

Part of the roof of the Dominion textile mill was blown in this afternoon, and quite a number of employees on the top flat are reported to have been seriously injured. In formation as to the actual number of injured or seriousness of their injuries cannot be obtained tonight. The disaster will result in part of the mill being shut down for some time. Telephone, electric light and fire alarm wires are demoralized. Three hundred telephone lines are out of business and Manager Peters has wired the general manager at St. John for assistance.

A little girl supposed to be on her way from school was picked up in a snow bank opposite the Royal Bank. Main street, about 1 o'clock in a half period of darkness. She was overcome by the storm and was lying in the snow when discovered by a passer-by, but when taken home she quickly recovered.

HARD BLOW FOR THE BIG RAILROADS

Railroad Men Would Rather Be Under Control of Congress Than Subject to the Various States.

Chicago, Ill., March 21.—E. H. Harman, President Stuckey of the Chicago, Great Western and other prominent railroad executives are quoted as saying that they would prefer that their roads be brought under the control of Congress rather than be subject to the legislation of the several states. It is not a chance at the list of anti-railroad measures passed in the various states during the past six months or so to show there is good reason for this preference on the part of the railroad officials. Congress, in response to the popular agitation, commenced the crusade for legislative regulation of railroads two years ago, but it is doubtful if even the most far seeing statesman dreamed then of the lengths to which the crusade would be pushed by the state.

The fever for anti-railroad legislation by the states has been sporadic in character. New England has been comparatively free from it, although no section of the country has better reason to complain of the domination of railroad combining New York has been busy regulating the insurance companies and other big corporations and as yet had not time to give a great deal of attention to the railroads. New Jersey and Delaware have not followed the road to any extent but Pennsylvania started an investigation that stirred things up and Ohio followed suit by striking the first successful blow for the 2-cent fare.

But it is in this section of the country, in the Mississippi valley and the prairie states, that the anti-railroad fever has manifested itself in its most virulent form. A wave of anti-railroad legislation has swept like a prairie fire from North Dakota to Texas. The most popular form of legislation were two cent a mile fare bills and bills authorizing state commissions to regulate rates and railroad affairs generally. A number of states passed such laws at the session now drawing to a close, or just ended, and in many other states agitation began which promises lively times at the next session.

Nebraska passed a two cent fare bill and then gave its attention to a terminal taxation measure, a bill reducing terminal taxes, and another other drastic anti-railroad legislation. Kansas passed a two cent fare bill providing for 500, 1,000 and 2,000 mile books, the 2,000 mile books to be interchangeable. Indiana also enacted a two cent fare act. North Dakota and South Dakota passed a number of anti-railroad bills, including two cent mileage books and two and one half cent flat fare.

In the Southern States there has been a great deal of recent legislation adverse to the railroads. The Alabama legislature used a particularly sharp stick, fixing rates on more than a hundred articles of freight, making prevailing reductions from existing tariffs, providing for reciprocal demurrage and reducing passenger fares to two and one-half cent a mile. The activities of the state legislatures in this direction were heartily supported and more or less directed by Governor B. B. Comer, who was elected to office on an anti-railroad platform.

The anti-railroad left the Rocky Mountain states almost immune, but showed itself in nearly all the states on the Pacific slope. Wyoming, Colorado and Utah declined to enter the anti-railroad crusade. Colorado passed a few harmless measures, and Montana contented herself with providing for a railroad commission. California was moderate in its demands on the railroads, passing a comprehensive law empowering the state commission to regulate rates, providing for reciprocal demurrage, and giving general restrictive control to the railroads. Washington has been hot on the trail of the railroads for a long time and Nevada now has a railroad commission with broad powers of regulation.

N. B. EXHIBITS SPORTSMEN'S SHOW

A Gleaner representative had a very interesting chat yesterday with Mr. Harry Allen, the well known and popular Penning guide, who has recently returned from the New York Sportsman's Show. Mr. Allen speaks in the highest terms of the great show and of the hearty reception the New Brunswick exhibitors received while there. When asked about the stealing of the deer head from the New Brunswick exhibit, of which he was in charge, Mr. Allen said that the fellow who walked off with the prize did not get far before being captured. He had tried to escape by three different doors, but was stopped at them all. As soon as the head was missed a search was made and a "tracer" put on the track, resulting in the arrest of an old time American crook, who was well known in police circles. Mr. Allen said that by the prolonged delay of the New Brunswick exhibit arriving at New York a grand advertisement was afforded, as everybody was asking what that large space was being reserved for. To explain matters the papers were filled with glowing accounts of the wonderful exhibit from down east which was daily expected, therefore when it did arrive, the crowds that collected to witness the erection of the camp and the putting together of the exhibit was the main attraction at the Big Fair. The exhibit has certainly done a great deal of good for the province, as a large number of sportsmen have already made arrangements to do their hunting and fishing in New Brunswick next season.

When asked about the famous Thaw trial, Mr. Allen said that the feeling in New York against the late Stanford White was very strong and it was the impression of a great many people that Harry Thaw would "walk out a free man." Mr. Allen said that the newspapers do not report one-fiftieth part of the proceedings of the trial.
