the coal bins which are kept well stocked by the Trustees. The Manual training room which is fully equipped but which, as yet has not been used because of the lack of an instructor, adjoins the boys' basement.

Let us ascend to the first floor through the plate glass swing doors with which the landings are equipped. There are seven rooms on this floor. One of them is used as a school library and laboratory. The Primary grades and advanced High School are taught in the other six rooms. This floor is heated by 32 steam radiators. The wire cage clock room on both this and the second floor prove a great convenience.

Let us go one higher. We may do this by one of three stairways. In six of the rooms on this floor the junior, intermediate, and Junior high school grades are taught. The other room is used as a Teachers' Library and is fitted out with a first Aid chest and beautiful furniture. This room is in the east or front of the Academy. There are thirty radiators on this floor. Both the first and second floors are supplied with sanitary bubblers and lavatories. There are two spacious stairways by which we ascend to the 3rd floor which has been finished recently. Here we find the Assembly Hall with Domestic Science room adjoining, which is partly equipped, but which cannot be used for want of an instructor. The Assembly Hall has a splendid stage

The outcome of the meeting was that a resolution was passed expressing the opinion that, if the Provincial Government, to meet and relieve the unemployment situation, will not accept the recommendations that have been made from time to time and proceed with the cutting down and repairing of the Mill Cove Bridge Hill, opposite Chatham, Mr. Martin and other representatives of Northumberland shall thereupon withdraw their support from the Foster Government in the Legislature.

President Keenan of the Labor Executive occupied the chair, and it is said that Mr. Martin expressed his willingness to be guided by the wishes of the meeting. He is said, however, to have told the meeting he expected their wishes would be met.

Fowle, Martin, Morrissy and Vanderbeck, appeared before the government on Wednesday and laid so strong a case before the department that a departure was made from the usual order of proceedings and the work authorized to be started at once. Superintendent D. Desmond was called to Frederickton and the whole matter was carefully gone into. TRY MOVIES TO CURE INSANE

Promoter Will Experiment on Atlantic County Asylum Inmates.

Atlantic City, N. J. March 20—Believing that many cases of mental disorder can be corrected through the medium of comedy "movies", Henry Wink, a motion picture magazine of New York and London, will conduct a series of experiments at the Atlantic City County Asylum for the insane.

Mr. Wink has already worked marvels among the crippled children at the Children's Seashore Home here by changing their dejected frame of mind to a brighter one. The "movie" physician holds that a great many cases can be materially aided by arousing the "Polyanna" spirit. Charlie Chaplin, Harold Lloyd and other screen comedians will disport on a specially constructed silver sheet at the asylum, in the belief that if the inmates can be interested in the pictures they will for that length of time at least, be normal and that a permanent normal condition can gradually be built up through a system of pictures which will slowly move from slapstick comedy to plays of the work-a-day world.
