Nuns as Farmers and Blacksmiths.

A community of pune called the Sisters of St. Dominic, who engage in farm labor and the arduous work of the blacksmith, is very interestingly described by "J. T. O'M." in the woman's section of Sydney " Daily Telegraph." The scene of these nune' work is the Convent of St. Dominic, King William's Town, Cape Colony. The, story seems almost incredible, but the sympathetic tone of the article seems to carry conviction as to the correctness of the particulars given :

"When the Sisters of St. Dominic first arrived in South Africa, eager to sow seeds of religion, they purchased an extensive farm, with the object of employing laborers to cultivate it for the support of their convent.
