Vancouver, Mar. 23.—The gasoline freighter Arthur B. born from Tacoma to Vancouver with 300 tons of cement, sank in the Gulf of Georgia, off the mouth of the Fraser river last night. The entire crew of six were drowned. The vessel was swamped by high seas.

To Obviate Coal Famine.

Lethbridge, Alta., March 23.—A meeting of C.P.R. officials and coal operators of Lethbridge division and Crow's Nest Pass decided to take steps to get dealers and consumers of coal to buy coal in summer months well before the winter sets in, thus obviating the danger of a coal famine.

He said: "The spineless rule of the viceroy, Lord Minto, is at the bottom of the trouble. He is a man who is like Kitchener or Curzon, who will take no nonsense."

U. S. MUST CONSULT CANADA

Winnipeg Scavenger's Guesseome Find.

Winnipeg, Man., Mar. 23.—A gruesome find was made this morning by scavenger Dave Harper, in the shape of the trunk of a man at the back of the Winnipeg laundry on Nena street. The head was close cropped and had a beard. The subject of a tragedy and the coroner was notified. There is no clue to the identity of the man, but it is thought to be accounted for by the frank carelessness of some medical student. While somewhat gruesome, but apparently the head had been exposed to the snow and weather for some time.

Terrible Death of Russian Brigades.

Breslau, Russia, Mar. 23.—Twenty Russians who have been plundering the frontier of the well known country house of the estate of Toman E. H. Erwiner, killed his sister and two men servants during a hand-to-hand fight, and then sacked the place.

ARRESTED MEN HAVE RIGHTS

Mayor Gaylor of New York Starts to Reform System of Rogues Galleries. New York, Mar. 23.—Mayor Gaylor is reforming the "Rogues Galleries" by his action as Judge Gaylor, previous to his election, he had arranged for the removal of the galleries from the Brooklyn police station, and he declared a victim of police prosecution, and he himself was arrested, held over night without permission to communicate with his family, and then lined up the next morning at headquarters with the day's grist of crooks, to be photographed and measured.

Boy Ground Under Car.

Montreal, March 23.—A fourteen-year-old boy, Napoleon Levesque, was killed under the wheels of a street car at the corner of Murray and Notre Dame streets, west of the city, this afternoon. The boy was attempting to cross the street, not noticing the rapidly approaching car. The motorist, seeing the boy, applied the brakes, but too late. The boy was knocked down, mangled and it took twenty minutes to get the remains from under the wheels.

Street Railway in Sherbrooke.

Sherbrooke, Que., Mar. 23.—This street railway extension by-law was passed today by the ratepayers of the city, by a vote of 336 to 56. The franchise, by a vote of 10 to 1, was extended for forty years, and the city is to have the right to expropriate at the end of twenty.

Police Chief in Trouble.

Belleveille, Ont., March 25.—Mr. Geo. Snider, who was at one time a member of the Belleveille police force and had been chief of police at Trenton, is accused of obtaining by false pretence a sum of money from a party who resides in Trenton. It is alleged that Snider secured the sum of \$30 from a man to be given to another party as a hush money for some transaction, and accused of giving the money to the party who had been given to him by him. He is, it is stated, a resident of Trenton, and is being held by the police at Trenton.
