### R.N.R. Invited to the Coronation

We are pleased to learn that His Majesty's Government has requested that the Newfoundland Naval Reserve should be represented by a detachment at the Coronation as guests of His Majesty's Government during their stay in England. The request is a graceful compliment paid to the Ancient Colony as one of the self-governing States of the Empire, and we presume it will be if it has not already been accepted. It is understood that some 60,000 soldiers and sailors from all parts of the Empire will be assembled in London to take part in the great historic pageant of the Coronation of King George and his Royal Consort Queen Mary. It will be remembered that His Majesty has appointed our greatest soldier, Field Marshal Viscount Kitchener, as Commander in Chief of the Coronation hosts, and his unique powers of organization and his presence brought to bear in making such arrangements as will ensure that our defenders at home and abroad will take a worthy part in the great event of the year.

### Legislature prorogued.

Detachments from the Royal Naval Reserve, the Constabulary and the Boys' Brigades were assembled yesterday afternoon before the Colonial Building when His Excellency the Governor arrived to prorogue the Legislature, which he did after assenting to the various bills.

### CLOSING SPEECH.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:  
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:  
I am gratified to be able to relieve you from your sessional duties so speedily, and congratulate you upon the businesslike promptness with which you have disposed of the measures submitted for your consideration. I trust that the expectations with regard to the several important measures relating to the establishment of new industries in the Colony will be more than realized, and that they may prove but the forerunners of others with a similar purpose.

The enactment confirming the contract for a Cold Storage enterprise is one fraught with great possibilities in the way of ensuring a better return to the fishermen of this Colony for the fruits of their labour; while the other measures which deal with industries and enterprises should stimulate the diversifying of such enterprises amongst us.

The appropriation which you have made for Old Age Pensions should prove a welcome boon to a very deserving class in this Colony, and I sincerely trust that the financial circumstances of the Colony may long continue to be such as will admit of the augmentation of this amount from year to year until every meritorious case shall have been dealt with, a hope which I feel sure you and the country in general will very heartily re-echo.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:  
I thank you for the supplies voted for the public service, and note with satisfaction that it has been found possible to substantially augment the appropriations for the various services without any increase in taxation.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:  
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

It is pleasing to observe, as an evidence of the growing fraternal spirit between the Motherland and the Overseas Possessions, that representatives of the Colonial Legislature have been invited by members of the British Parliament to visit England as their guests during the Coronation period. It is equally pleasant, and should be a matter of no small pride as well to Newfoundland, that His Majesty's Government has requested that a contingent of the Newfoundland Naval Reserve should also be represented by a detachment, who will be guests of His Majesty's Government during their stay in England.

In relieving you from your duties, I would extend to you my sincere wishes for the prosperity of the Colony and your personal well-being.

GLACE BAY, To-Day.  
A unanimous report from the Board of Conciliation, enquiring into the cause of dispute between Morien Mines and the North Atlantic Colliery Co., has been received from the Department of Labor. The chief point is that the Company violated the Industrial Disputes Act, by making a reduction of wage, without notifying the men.

ST. PETERSBURG, To-Day.

LISBON, March 29.  
The Manda, the official organ, states that the provisional government has discovered a monarchical secret society with many branches and members throughout the whole country. ANTWERP, March 29.  
The diversion of European emigration from the United States to Canada is said to be seriously affecting the Atlantic Steamship Lines. The Red Star to-day gives up the American Canada line two of the best special emigrant vessels afloat. There are now 1,500 emigrants bound to Canada held up here for lack of transportation facilities.

### Objects to the Opening of Letter

### Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—On Monday I received a large envelope in which a relative had sent me a few ends of ribbon for neckwear. This was opened and 40c. duty assessed, to which of course I could not object, realizing that the present Government needs such small sums to help towards extra salaries to their friends. Inside the large envelope, however, (on which the full letter rate was paid) was a letter enclosed in a small closed envelope, which had been opened at the Post Office, and I presume read by the Customs' Clerk. To this I strongly object, as the sender had a perfect right to send a letter, and the bare fact of its being enclosed in a separate cover, showed that it was not intended for the eyes of anyone but the person to whom it was addressed. No invoice was necessary for the valuation of the items, which could easily have been forwarded as Sample Post. The letter contained references of a purely private family character, and I contend should only have been opened in the presence of the addressee, even had it been enclosed in a sample-post package. In the present instance it was unpardonable and nothing can justify such an action.


