The Morocco Trouble.

It may not be uninteresting to note that the obligation of Great Britain to give diplomatic support to France arises out of the Anglo-French Convention of 1904, under which France gave up her territorial claims on the West Coast of Newfoundland. The British Government recognized that France had special interests in Morocco, and undertook to place no obstacles in the way of French intervention to maintain order and secure reform. The British Government also promised France its diplomatic support in Morocco. Germany has looked on at the increasing influence of France in Morocco with uneasiness, and her intervention led eventually to the Algeiras Act, signed by the Powers, which guaranteed the integrity of Morocco, the sovereignty of the Sultan and the open door for trade. It is, however, alleged that France and Spain had a secret understanding and that both have been making expeditions and seizures for the purposes of dividing up Morocco; and that this action led to the seizure of Agadir in Morocco by Germany. This action of Germany, outside of any obligation to France, is regarded by Britain as a menace to her trade routes and led to the present attitude of Britain towards Germany.

Autos Returned.

The automobiles of Messrs. Reid, Bowring and Parker, which carried the Delegate and party to Portugal Cove this morning, returned at noon today. The party embarked on the s.s. Fife for Bell Island. The ship looked very beautiful adorned with flags from rail to mainmast. An informal reception took place before the yacht left the Cove. Those gentlemen who went down from the city and lent their motor cars were presented to His Excellency.

Papal Delegate at Portugal Cove.

This morning Monsignor Stagni, the Papal Delegate, accompanied by the Archbishop, Bishop March and others visited Portugal Cove, and showed much interest in the old type of Irish church which is to be found there. In the church there was a bigger gathering than had ever been known before, and the Delegate bestowed the Pope's blessing on those present. The party were entertained to luncheon at the Presbytery by Fr. Gough, and at 11:30 left for Bell Island in the yacht Fife.

German Press Says "Hands Off."

The tone of the newspapers discussing the Moroccan question is much calmer than yesterday. The Anzeiger says Germany is not inclined to permit such wanton and frivolous intervention as is preached in the English press, and warns mediocres and disturbers to keep their hands off.

Balfour Beats the Insurgents.

LONDON, To-Day.
The banner of revolt against Balfour and Lansdowne was raised last night at the dinner given in honour of Earl Halsbury, which the extremists among the Unionists intended should be a demonstration of their strength. Several hundred Unionist peers and members of the Commons were present and cheered the policy of resistance. A letter from "Joe" Chamberlain said: "I heartily support the object of the meeting. The country owes a great debt to Lord Halsbury, since at this crisis in its history he has refused to surrender principles." Lord Selborne said: "In this crisis each peer has an individual constitutional responsibility above all party ties. The division in our party is in the simple issue of the creation of peers, when this issue is passed, the party will close its ranks and fight for the restoration of the constitution and the repeal of the Parliament Act." Mr. Austin Chamberlain made a stirring speech. When he had finished there were cries of "Future Prime Minister." A reference to Premier Asquith was greeted with cries of "Traitor." Chamberlain said it was unthinkable that a great historic assembly like the House of Lords, with its fine traditions behind it, should acquiesce in the surrender of its constitutional rights and its national duty. The final solution of the political crisis is uncertain, but it may be safely assumed that Balfour and Lansdowne will remain in the saddle as leaders of the Unionist party. Balfour in one of the most serious crisis in his career has again proved himself the party leader. No sooner was his letter, affirming his intention to stand or fall by Lansdowne, published than the incipient mutiny collapsed. The organizers of the Halsbury banquet tumbled over each other in hasty repudiation of being disloyal to Balfour. A list of more than 250 peers was published last night who declared themselves supporters of Lansdowne's policy, and they will let the parliamentary bill pass under protest. The peers adhering to Halsbury do not exceed 150.

A Deadlock.

The Foreign Office, adhering to the pact with the German Foreign Office, refrains from all communications to the press regarding Franco-German negotiations. It is understood here that the situation is unsatisfactory. The status of the negotiations might almost be described as a deadlock.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
Instructions for the administration of so much of the Customs law as is effective until the whole Reciprocity Agreement is ratified by the Canadian Parliament were telegraphed to the Customs Collectors along the Canadian border. Until the Canadian Parliament has ratified the agreement, only Section Two which covers wood pulp, paper, and paper-boards will be effective.
