Doing Up  
the Packages

Vastly Important Detail to Assure  
Unfaded Appreciation.

To send a package that isn't  
"Christmas looking" is bound to de-  
tract from the gift. There are stick-  
ers of all sizes and shapes, with Santa  
Claus, bells, sprays, red and gold  
balls, "Merry Christmas" and gayly  
decorated trees upon them. These  
stickers not only make a parcel more  
attractive, but they are a great help  
in tying up, especially a bulky parcel  
like a sofa pillow, which requires sev-  
eral sheets of tissue paper.

Red, bright green or holly bay  
ribbon is used for doing up most par-  
cels that are not to go through the  
mail. The adhesive red and green  
paper ribbon is often substituted for  
the other kinds, or sometimes the  
outer wrapping has the patterned rib-  
bon, while the inner tissue paper is  
red.

Inside, instead of using a regular  
filling card, the name of the sender





Big Fish Cargo.

When the S. S. Edisto is dischar-  
ged and repaired she will take away  
from here one of the largest if not the  
largest fish cargo ever taken out of  
St. John's. She will take fully 6,000  
packages for the Mediterranean, con-  
sisting about 24,000 quintals. Most  
of these packages have been packed  
in different outports which is a loss to  
our labouring men and to coopers also  
as the packages were made outside St.  
John's. Owing to the large shipments  
of fish made by steam this season  
there will soon be a shortage of fish  
in the stores and there will be little  
labor given as a result during the  
winter months.

The S. S. Cacouna Capt. Holmes, ar-  
rived here at 10 o'clock last night  
from Charlottetown direct after a very  
good run. She left there Friday  
morning and had moderate but very  
cold weather to this port. She brought  
a full cargo of produce which includ-  
ed 35 head cattle, 20 sheep and a lot  
of Christmas goods.

LONDON, Dec. 17.  
An announcement was made to-day  
of the fusion of the will of the King,  
Royal Mail Line, Steam Packet Co.  
and Elder Dempster Line of steamers.  
Amalgamated, the ships total 181,  
with a tonnage of 728,000.

BERLIN, To-day.  
The Imperial Budget for the year  
beginning April 1st will require an or-  
dinary expenditure of \$712,500,000. The  
conditions are so favourable that the  
Government now asks authority to  
borrow for extraordinary expenditures  
\$10,925,000 against \$24,250,000 last  
year.

HALIFAX, To-day.  
The coasting steamer Avon, sudden-  
ly sank in dock yesterday. The cause  
is unknown, but it is thought a sea-  
cock was left open.

The story that the British Admiralty  
has secured plans of the locks, the  
water-supply, and the secret signal  
codes of Wilhelmshaven, the idea  
in the event of war of blowing up the  
harbour entrance and thus bottling up  
the German fleet, is regarded here as  
merely romance. It is further alleged  
that to avoid this supposed danger the  
Government fleet was kept for weeks  
in the open sea during the recent crisis.  
These stories are supposed to have  
been betrayed by German officials to  
the Rhenish Westphalian Zeitung  
which is strongly anti-British, and an  
organ of the war material trade.

COLOGNE, To-day.  
The Cologne Gazette's inspired dis-  
patch from Berlin says: "Commenting  
on the London News article in  
which Anglo-German relations 'are  
discussed,' asserts that the desire for  
better relations will not be satisfied  
unless English speeches be followed  
by English deeds. One could believe  
from reading the Daily News that the  
greatest good feeling exists among  
the English, and that closer relations  
would be in no wise difficult. Unfor-  
tunately it must be said that the Daily  
News is far from being an exception  
of opinion which now as formerly ap-  
proves of a policy which can be blam-  
ed for the present situation. Of  
course, continuing the present policy  
are some prominent Englishmen who  
have preserved the historic British  
open-mindedness towards us. Lord  
Bereford appears to have joined them  
recently, but their influence is not  
strong enough to banish in regard to  
German policies what they believe to  
be behind them. The conviction that  
Germany is threatening Britain  
with a sinister plan. This is so firmly  
rooted through years of incitement  
by the Press that it would be difficult  
to shake it off. How deep this conviction is,  
and how it raises blind hatred, can be seen  
from letters which have been uttered  
against Germany."

COLOGNE, To-day.  
The Rhenish Westphalian Zeitung  
publishes a story of the alleged dis-  
covery of a plan on the part of Britain  
to blow up Wilhelmshaven. The Zeit-  
ung professes to have received this  
information from one of the best in-  
formed officials who said the Postal  
authorities are becoming suspicious of  
repeated money orders in favour of  
dock officers. The chief mates finally  
seized some letters passing through  
the Postal Department. These show-  
ed plans of the British Admiralty to  
shaven Harbor as well as plans of the  
water-supply and the contents of the  
secret code book, which had been be-  
trayed to the British Admiralty. The  
paper points out that with such infor-  
mation at its command, Britain could  
blow up the entrances to the war  
harbour at a decisive moment, render-  
ing the harbour utterly useless to Ger-  
many at the very beginning of the  
war and render her helpless to de-  
fend herself at sea. To prevent the  
threatened danger, the Zeitung con-  
tinued, the German squadron re-  
mained for weeks on patrol duty. The  
recent conferences between the Em-  
peror and the Minister of Marine and  
the chief Admiralty staff at the Mar-  
ine Department dealt with the danger.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.  
Mexico was rocked from ocean to  
ocean in the north, to the isthmus of Tehuantepec,  
to the south, by an earthquake. The dis-  
turbance was felt mostly in the State  
of Guerrero, especially was the move-  
ment much greater at Chilpancingo.  
A few flimsy buildings were thrown  
down, and telegraph and telephone  
and other wires snapped and for a time  
the city was without light from the  
breaking of connections with power  
stations.
