Empire Day at Whitbourne.

For several days previous the members of the W. P. A. were very busy preparing the good things which were to be sold on Empire Day for the benefit of the Red Cross funds.

Visitors to our village on that day would see two beautiful white tents erected at the railway station, over which the Red Cross flag was flying. The tents held the good things for sale and were presided over by the young ladies of the W. P. A. These ladies were dressed in the costume of the Red Cross nurse, and it would be difficult to find a more beautiful sight than they presented as they glided from place to place attending to the wants of their many customers.

As the different trains steamed into the station they would be boarded by the young ladies bearing baskets of refreshments, to which the attention of the passengers would be called, the ladies explaining that the proceeds were to be devoted to the funds of the Red Cross Association.

Although the weather on that day left much to be desired, the young ladies remained at their post all through the day, and with their bright smiles and kindly words succeeded in bringing many customers to their tents. In the evening they continued their efforts at the Meth-

dist Schoolroom, where patriotic speeches and songs were rendered and the remainder of the good things disposed of. When the Treasurer gave in her report it was found that the splendid sum of \$62.00 was the result of the day's work. This speaks volumes for the untiring energy of the ladies having the matter in hand.

Since the war began the Whitbourne W. P. A. has raised nearly five hundred dollars, and seven hundred pairs of socks have been knit and sent to the W.P.A. at St. John's.

The success of the Whitbourne W. P. A. must largely be attributed to Mrs. Leslie, the President. During the past three years this lady has been untiring in her efforts to gain money to help alleviate the sufferings of our boys at the front and in the navy, of which Whitbourne has a large number compared to our population.

With your permission, Mr. Editor, I shall have a word to say in the near future regarding the number of men Whitbourne has contributed to the Army and Navy and of the gallant part they have played in the great struggle now going on.

Hudson Maxim

Has Perfected a Device to Make Ships Immune from the Dangers of the Submarine.

New York, May 23.—Hudson Maxim announced yesterday that he had invented and perfected a device which will make ships immune from the dangers of the submarine. He said that torpedoes, even when fired at close range, and striking their targets, would explode harmlessly against the hulls of their intended victims.

The inventor made the announcement at a luncheon given in Brooklyn. He asserted that the invention soon will be demonstrated by the government, which already had been advised of the details.

"The invention is practically for every type of vessel," he said. "It can be applied within a few months, at a comparatively cheap price, to the hulls of ships already constructed. The only change necessary in vessels already built will be a slight enlargement in their beams. My device is of solid material and encircles the entire hull of the ship from the bow to the stern. It in no sense or manner resembles either a screen or net."
