



Oil Well in Britain.

The Government is taking upon
itself the right to bore for petroleum
in the United Kingdom, in order to
prevent our oilfields being exploited
by private individuals for their own
benefit, as our coalfields have been.

This raises anew the question as to
whether there do actually exist be-
neath our soil oil deposits of a kind
similar to those found in the United
States, Mexico, Russia and elsewhere.

Scientists are pretty well agreed
that such is the case, and that the oil
only needs searching for systematic-
ally by boring.

As a matter of fact, indeed, oil has
been "struck" in England at fairly
frequent intervals during the past
hundred years or so, though not in
paying quantities.

At Kellam, near Newark, for in-
stance, in August, 1911, crude petro-
leum was found by boring at a depth
of 2,440 feet. The well yielded from
five to eight gallons daily for several
months. Then it petered out.

Another well at Clowne, near Ches-
terfield, yielded seventy to one hun-
dred gallons daily. A bore at Coal-
port gave one thousand gallons a
week for several weeks. At Alfreton,
Derbyshire, a refinery was actually
set up to deal with the petroleum
found there, but the supply soon dried
up.—Pearson's Weekly.

Haig's Big Move.

Haig's Big Move.

(From the Boston Transcript.)

Sir Douglas Haig is creeping up
on the German line of communications
between Ostend and Lille, and both he
and the bombardment British fleet are
menacing the German submarine base
at Ostend and incidentally threaten-
ing that at Zeebrugge. The tactical
significance of Sir Douglas Haig's
latest operations lies not so much in
their actual conquest of important
ground as in the new demonstration
of the fact that when the British
want ground they are able to take it,
the Germans being no longer capable
of resistance to the pushes which the
British commander is continually
making. Of course it is not assumed
by Sir Douglas or by any one else
that the German line here is broken,
or is immediately breakable. But if
one mile is taken this week, another
may be taken another week, and the
German line of communications is
but six miles away. Its penetration
would eventually involve a withdraw-
al similar to that which was enforced
by the great Somme offensive of the
British and French. And what would
be the effect of another such with-
drawal on the German national psy-
chology? Things are certainly pro-
ceeding very well on the British line.
Before snow flies in Belgium they
may proceed better yet.
