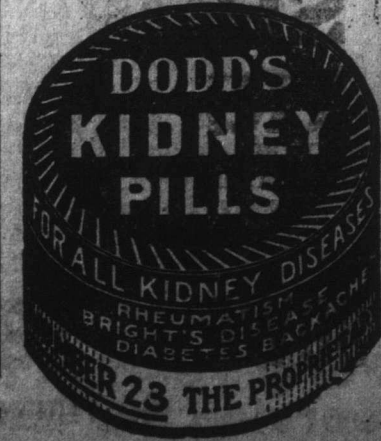

### New English Sailings.

The following message from Major  
 Montgomerie, now at Halifax, was re-  
 ceived yesterday by the Ministry of  
 Shipping:

"Have arranged rates of freight  
 from Newfoundland to Liverpool, ef-  
 fective immediately, one dollar hun-  
 dred pounds, or fifty cents cubic  
 foot, ship's option, except sailings  
 from Liverpool as follows, Graciana,  
 Jan. 31st, Sackem, Mar. 8th, and Dig-  
 by a fortnight later. Understand two  
 latter boats will carry passengers, but  
 will advise definitely later. Suggest  
 in view of reduced rates shippers may  
 wish to ship considerable cargo on  
 Graciana, in which case it would be  
 advisable to obtain space from direct-  
 or of overseas transport."

Merchants intending to ship by Gra-  
 ciana, should report space wanted  
 promptly to Minister of Shipping.



## Money Not Everything.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—Being interested in the  
 future welfare of those who have  
 helped to secure liberty and freedom  
 for us by their untold sacrifices I  
 went to hear what Dr. Jones had to  
 say on the subject, Sunday night last,  
 and to see if he had any new ideas for  
 the solving of one of the greatest and  
 most important problems that ever  
 this country had confronting it. But  
 I came away from the service sadly  
 disappointed, as if I can believe my  
 ears he said he intended to make a  
 plea on their behalf, but he had re-  
 ceived authorized information to the  
 effect that a dose of money was to be  
 handed out to them which unarm-  
 ed him from making the plea as he in-  
 tended to do. Well, sir, from my  
 point of view it is not going to be set-  
 tled quite so easily as that, for after  
 all it is not their own they will be  
 receiving if they ever do get what he  
 mentioned. A few paltry dollars will  
 never make up for all they have sac-  
 rificed, but I say by all means let  
 them have the money and more if it  
 can be got for them.

I noticed, too, that he said provi-  
 sion was being made for the educating  
 of those who required it, but I think  
 we'll find that only a few will have  
 the patience at their age to waste time  
 obtaining what they were deprived of  
 when they should have had those pri-  
 vileges.

I have failed to see a broad view  
 of the situation taken by any of  
 those who are interested in the prob-  
 lem of re-establishing our boys, and  
 I find that the Re-establishing Com-  
 mittee are "up against it" to find suit-  
 able positions for the few applicants  
 that come to them. Considering the  
 fact that employment can't be found  
 for the few score who require it now,  
 what will happen when the bulk of  
 them get back and we have nothing  
 for them to do. They can be "hushed  
 up" for a while with the dollar but  
 they'll eventually want work. That  
 is the "rub" and what are we going to  
 do about it? Will it be said we can't  
 and anything for them to do? Or on  
 the other hand will we see that the  
 work is created for them. It is up to  
 us to solve this problem right now or  
 suffer for it later.

I think if a general statement of  
 conditions of our public utilities, as  
 they prevail to-day, were given it  
 would soon be made clear that im-  
 provements are needed all around and  
 the next question is the raising of  
 money to do so. I say let us raise  
 the money as it was raised for the  
 Victory Loan and then put it in the  
 hands of Christian men to spend it  
 right. By doing so you would be  
 creating what is needed to keep our  
 boys from going where life is not the

burden that it is likely to be for them  
 if conditions are allowed to prevail  
 here as they are to-day. When our  
 men get back we should see to it that  
 it will be as profitable for them to  
 live in Newfoundland as it would be  
 in Canada or the United States. If  
 not, we'll be saying good-bye to them  
 again, and that will be our greatest  
 loss. Therefore I say let us begin  
 working. Thanking you for space, I

 on its waiting lap.

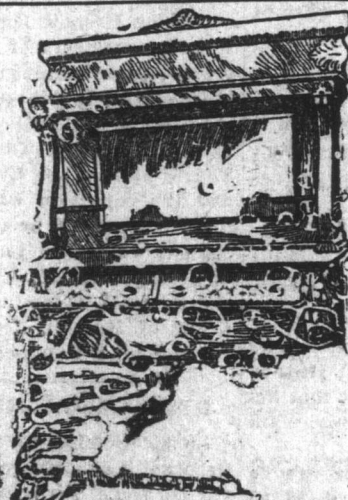
But while for war and all its hell I

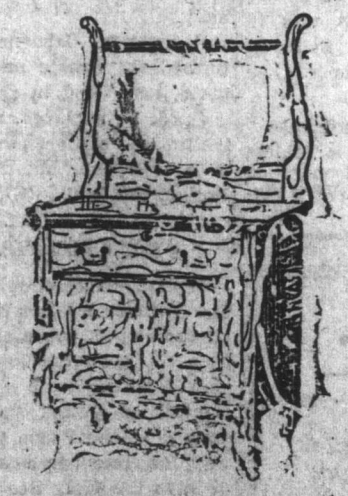

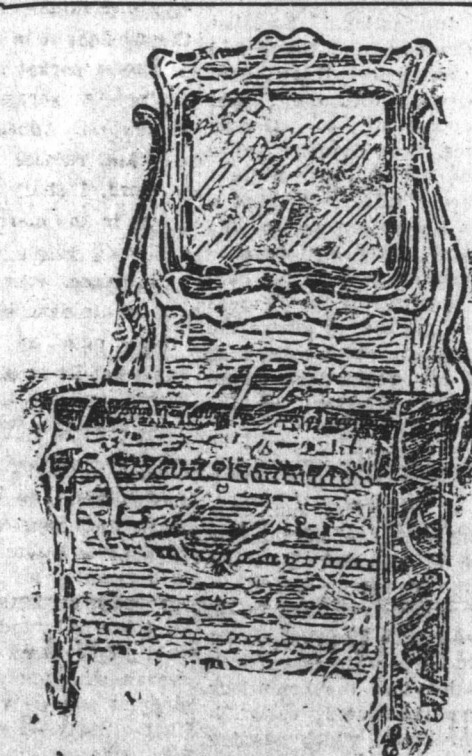

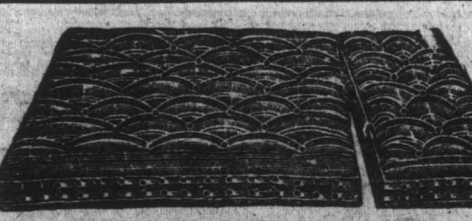
