Before the Boyne.

The battle of the Boyne, fought on July 12, 1690, between a mixed force of English and Dutch under William of Orange, and the Irish under the nominal command of James II., is still a source of strife in Ireland. It is, therefore, curious to reflect that it was within a very narrow margin either of never having been fought at all, or else of not having been associated with the name of Dutch William. For, if a cannon ball had gone a hair's breadth nearer on the previous day, William would have been killed, an event of which it would not be easy to compute the consequences. It was while he was breakfasting at a spot (since marked by an obelisk) well m view of the Irish, some of whose leading officers had their attention attracted by the large staff surrounding William, as he sat to eat his meal.
