FISHERIES DEVELOPMENT

Those who support and advocate the present policy of the Government and Trade, touching the controlled sale of our staple product in foreign markets, would do well to take into consideration the fact that the year 1921 will find every country having outlets to the salt water, preparing to do something toward the development of the fish products of the sea. Realizing that fish will form the chief and cheapest food of the future, every effort is being directed toward increasing the production, and countries that have hitherto been content to draw their supplies from others are now entering into the business of fish catching, for home consumption primarily, and for export should the supply exceed the domestic demand. There is not the slightest doubt but that keen competition will have to be faced by Newfoundland, during the ensuing year, and different methods of procedure in our trade relations with fish buying customers will have to be adopted if we are to successfully face the issue which is ahead. The use of the bludgeon will have to be discontinued and more diplomatic measures adopted if we are to retain our customers. Newfoundland may be courageous enough to meet the four corners of the world in a tilt over Fishery Control, but she would be exceedingly unwise to do so, and would undoubtedly come off second best in the melee.

Japan has already been spoken of in this column as a formidable competitor in the fish trade. The waters of the Pacific Ocean are open to her fishing craft, while considerable exploitation of Japanese inshore fisheries has already taken place, and it is noteworthy that

several cargoes of Japanese salted codfish have recently been shipped to Pacific ports of the United States. Beside these, Japanese bankers operating on the Siberian fishing grounds are bringing their catches direct to American seaports for sale. This entrance into the American markets will not affect Newfoundland in any way, but is merely quoted to prove that the importance of increased fish production is being seriously considered by countries which are in a position to prosecute such an industry. From Japan to Poland is a far cry, but the Poles have now a sea coast of their own, and intend to utilize the advantages this gives them of entering upon the prosecution of the fisheries of the Baltic Sea, and a large company has been formed for the distribution of fish throughout Poland. Thus will that country be supplied with fish foods from its own fishermen, and may yet become a potential competitor of ours.

The Italian Government—and Italy was always one of our best customers, until the year of grace 1920, when the Fish Regulations were responsible for the cessation of usual business—have in view the promotion of national fisheries, which the war had caused to dwindle to almost the vanishing point. And not alone are the Italian authorities giving attention to the development of their Mediterranean fishing possibilities, but they are devoting large sums on improving inland fisheries (fresh water) and in restocking these by the establishment of hatcheries which will be premiumized. Thus is Italy endeavoring to find a means of local supply for home consumption, which if successful—and there is no reason why the scientific application of restocking measures should not be—will mean a gradual falling off in purchases from other countries. This is a matter of which particular notice should be taken by those interested in the increased production and ready sale of Newfoundland fish, and instant measures formulated and adopted to meet such extra competition as this country may expect to find in the very near future. All our foreign customers are about to become engaged in sea fishing, and it is about time that cognizance was taken of changing conditions.

Fish Exporters

DISCUSS PORTUGUESE SALES.
A meeting of the Fish Exporters interested in the Portuguese market, was held to-day in the Board of Trade Rooms when the subject of Mr. Cook's plan of sales to Portugal was further discussed. The proposition as put forward by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, would be of great benefit to the trade and most of the exporters are agreeable to it, and are disposed to wait and see if the project will materialize, and for this it is thought that the time limit which at the previous meeting was set for Jan. 31st, will have to be further extended.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DISTINGUISHED PRELATE DEAD.
LONDON, Jan. 28.
Dr. Thomas Whitehead, Archbishop of Liverpool, is dead. All Roman Catholic sees in Great Britain with the exception of Westminster and Edinburgh are now vacant.

AGREEMENT REACHED.

PARIS, Jan. 28.
The session of the Committee of Experts of the Allied Supreme Council ended at 12.30 o'clock this morning, after having reached a complete agreement on the system of annual payments of reparations by Germany, and annuities on Germany's foreign trade. It now remains only for a plenary sitting of the Supreme Council to-day (Saturday) to endorse the agreement, draw up instructions for Brussels experts, and fix penalties for defaults by Germany. Premier Briand declared, as he came out from the meeting early this morning, that the conference of the Supreme Council would not break up without having reached a definite decision.

FINANCIAL EXPERT DISAPPROVES.

LONDON, Jan. 28.
Reginald McKenna, former Financial Secretary of the Treasury, presiding at a general meeting of the London Joint City and Midland Bank, of which he is director and chairman, said the government's proposed deflation policy, involving dear money and rigid restriction of credit, was impracticable.

Charles I. Beheaded But Honored.

On January 30, 1649, at ten o'clock in the morning, Charles the First walked across from St. James' Palace to Whitehall, in London, calling on his guard "in a pleasant manner" to walk aside, and at two o'clock he stepped through a window of the Banqueting House on to the scaffold, and spoke to William Juxon, Archbishop of Canterbury, and the others attending his Majesty, declaring that he had desired the liberty and freedom of the people as much as anyone, "but their liberty consists in having from Government those laws by which their life and their goods may be most their own, not in having a share in the government. A subject and sovereign are clean," (or, "truly") "different things." This recalls the Bible words, "I will walk at liberty, for I seek thy precepts" (Psalm cxix. 45), which means "I will live independently of people's opinions, because I seek to follow thy precepts." The king then declared that he died a member of the Church of England, and lastly he spoke to Juxon this mysterious word "Remember," and then laid his head upon the block, and it was smitten off. Thus was the old catch rhyme true that "Charles the First walked and talked; half an hour after his head was cut off." Omitting the semi-colon gives it quite a different though impossible meaning. But though beheaded Charles I. has been honored by Samuel Rawson Gardiner, a most trustworthy and complete author of English history in the seventeenth century, who, while treating fairly his own ancestor, Oliver Cromwell, wrote of Charles the First, that he was "honestly anxious to take the right path, and would never for expediency's sake pursue that which he believed to be a wrong one."

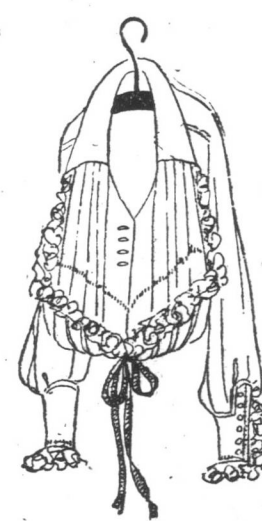
