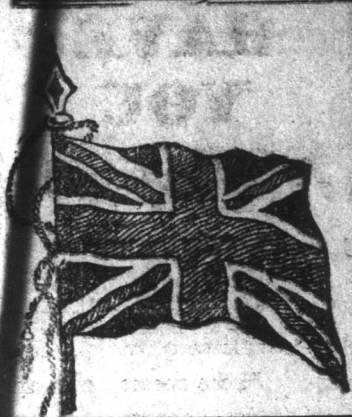

Newfoundland's Tribute To Her Gallant Dead

On June 9th, 1921, a representative gathering of citizens, convened by Mr. P. E. Outerbridge, met in the Board of Trade Rooms and discussed suggestions in connection with the erection of a Newfoundland War Memorial. The whole gathering was unanimously of the opinion that the suggestion was a most worthy one, and a great tribute was paid to Messrs. R. G. Rendell and P. E. Outerbridge, the originators of the plan, by appointing them Chairman and Secretary respectively and authorizing them to appoint the Executive Committee. To decide as to act, and thanks to the energy and enthusiasm of these gentlemen and their Committee, and the hearty response from citizens generally, it was not long before the sum of \$20,000 was raised and the movement to erect a Memorial in keeping with the part which Newfoundland took in the war was successfully launched.

At the instigation of Lieut. Colonel Nangle, C.F., the G.W.V.A. undertook to carry the plans to completion, and as a result of the President's indomitable energy and enterprise, the exceedingly beautiful Memorial which Field Marshal Earl Haig unveiled became an accomplished fact. To those who took the initiative and to the Great War Veterans' Association the whole community is under a great debt which it can never adequately repay, but they had ample cause to feel gratified with their accomplishment and with the appreciation of the public on the occasion of the unveiling, and with the remarkable success of the whole of their arrangements.

Tuesday's event is one which will ever be remembered by those who were present and will be retold to future generations with pride and reverence. Nothing perhaps adds so much to the impressiveness of such an occasion as an immense crowd of intensely earnest people. The naval and military contingents, the former representative of the three great powers, gave to the ceremony a martial air, and at the same time showed a common accord and sentiment. Dignity and solemnity were given to the proceedings by the presence of the high Church officials, the Commander-in-Chief of the Imperial Forces, and the Representative of His Majesty the King. A note of pathos was supplied by aged parents or fatherless children, wearing the decorations of him to whom the Memorial had been erected.

The Monument which stood revealed as Field Marshal Earl Haig withdrew the covering was received with a silence far more expressive than words of the admiration and wonder of the gazing thousands. The graceful female figure surmounting the group and holding in the one hand the Torch of Purity, and in the other the Sword of Freedom; the splendid types of Soldier and Sailor on the left and right; the rugged beauty of the figures representing Forestry and the Mercantile Marine at the

base with the Cross in the background, form a masterpiece in design and workmanship that has seldom been excelled.

Newfoundland may well take pride in the monument which she has erected to her Gallant Dead, and those who were mainly responsible for the execution and erection are to be heartily congratulated on the success of their achievement.

The King's Bench is for ever hallowed ground, and to guard and cherish and reverence our Memorial is a duty incumbent on all, both young and old. It will ever remind us of the splendid response made by the youth of Newfoundland when their services were required, and of the heroic sacrifice willingly made in defence of those principles which the name of Britain stands for.

Review at St. George's Field

Yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, Earl Haig reviewed the different city Brigades, Girl Guides and Boy Scout troops, at St. George's Field. The distinguished visitor was accompanied by Colonel Halse, Lt.-Col. Talbot, Capt. Simpson and Padre Nangle. Upon arrival of the party, the parade, fully 1,600 strong, was drawn up in massed formation with the various city bands in attendance. Following the inspection the various units, to the music of the bands, marched past the grand stand where Field Marshal Haig acknowledged the salute. The marching of all ranks was of a very high order, and Earl Haig felt highly pleased with the standard of efficiency shown. A large gathering of citizens watched the review. At the close three ringing cheers were given with a will. The proceedings terminated with the playing of the National Anthem, after which the various units disbanded.

Motor Truck Turns Over

MT. CASHEL LADS PRECIPITATED TO THE STREET.

While proceeding from Patrick into Power Street on Tuesday morning last, a motor truck, carrying some fifteen members of the Mount Cashel Band, to take part in the parade, and in charge of Rev. Bro. Ennis, capsized, throwing the occupants to the ground. Fortunately they all escaped serious injuries, with the exception of Neil Farrell, a lad of 12 years, who now lies in hospital suffering from a badly crushed arm. Three of the boys received minor cuts about the face and hands, and were able to attend the parade after they had their wounds dressed by Mr. Peter O'Mara. The accident was caused by the breaks refusing to respond when about to turn into Power Street. The escape was a very miraculous one, and had it not been for the roof covered truck, fatal results would have probably followed.

JOHN T. CROUCHER.

Messrs. Baine Johnston & Co. received a wireless from Battle Harbor this morning informing them of the sudden death of Mr. John T. Croucher, which occurred at that place last night.

Mr. Croucher was apparently in his usual good health when he retired last evening, therefore the suddenness of his passing comes as a great shock to his many friends.

The deceased was a native of Dorchester, England, and was in his sixty-eight year. He came to Newfoundland when quite a young man and for a number of years was prominently identified with the firm of Waterman & Co., Twillingate. Later he entered the firm of Baine Johnston & Co., as their agent with premises at Battle Harbor, and for the past quarter of a century he held that position with trust. The deceased leaves to mourn a wife and several children.
