THE LAW OF INTEREST.—Mr. Rose has introduced certain resolutions, with a view to change the present law respecting the rates of interest chargeable on loans, etc. As the law now stands, banks are not permitted to charge over seven per cent interest for moneys loaned, while some other corporations, such as building societies, may charge a higher rate than that, but individuals may arrange to pay any rate that they may deem proper.

NEW LAW OF EVIDENCE.—It is being sought, in England, to amend the somewhat anomalous state of the law of evidence, which, on technical grounds, often excludes testimony of great importance and value, and which ought, in justice, to be laid before the jury.
