OUTRAGES IN IRELAND. Earl Russell evidently has little faith in the potency of the Church Bill to prevent outrages in Ireland. Perhaps he is right, for although disestablishment may do something to-wards silencing the murmurs of one portion of the population it will go but a short way in quenching the animosi-ty which has subsisted for ages be-tween the two great parties into which the country is divided. Indeed it is not improbable that this feeling may be augmented and intensified, for there are those who look with no small degree of disfavor on the conces which the Government are now almost sure to yield. But if this be an evil there can be no doubt it is the less of two, between which it was necessary to chose. No legislation can extinguish party spirit, although it may prevent party demonstrations and punish those who engage in party fights. While there are such men as the Mayor of Cork there will be such combinations as the Prentice Boys, and vice versa, and the settlement of the Church and Land Questions even on the most equitable basis will do little towards inducing them to dwell in amity. That will be the work of the millenium alone. What can the Government do to stop outrages? Nothing at all to stop them permanently, that is, so that they will not occur again. What have they always done? Nothing but what they have had to repeat, and so far as we learn they have no new magic agency at command. The terrible riots which occurred not long since in Belfast were quelled by the military, like all others, and it was thought that the damage, suffering and loss of life inflicted then would produce a salutary effect much more lasting than it appears to have been. Again the same agency was employed in Tipperary and Derry, but all will not deter from fresh outbursts of party passion. To do so is one of the impossibilities, nor can it be accomplished until there come a revolution in that dividend of human nature which makes its home in Ireland. Even intellectual education, powerful as it is for good, will never cradicate the evil; it is 'the old man with his deeds' that does the mischief, and though he may be frightened for a moment by enquiries in Parliament about his doings, and by the clinking sabres of cavalry even these will not keep him long quiescent. prevent party demonstrations and pun-ish those who engage in party fights.

Religious excitement appears to be greatly on the increase in the Mohammedan world. The greatest trouble the British in India at present meet is from the Mohammedan sect of the Wahabees. The same sect last year obtained complete control of Muscat, the greatest Mohammedan State in Arabia. A few days ago a cable despatch informed us of a desperate riot between two religious sects in the streets of Teheran, the capital of Persia. Three hundred men were killed before the troops came out and suppressed the riot. The name of the sects concerned in the riot is not stated; but as Persia several years ago was greatly disturbed by a sect of Reformers called Babis, or followers of Bab, md as this sect, notwithstanding its cruel persecution by the Persian Government, ispreported to have now numerous adherents in every town and village of Persia, and to number in all some three millions of adherents, it is probable that it was not foreign to the riot.

THE LAW OF INTEREST.—Mr. Rose has introduced certain resolutions, with a view to change the present law respecting the rates of interest chargeable on loans, etc. As the law now stands, banks are not permitted to charge over seven per cent interest for moneys loaned, while some other corporations, such as building societies, may charge a higher rate than that, but individuals may arrange to pay any rate that they may deem proper. Mr. Rose proposes that the law, in so far as it effects Banks and other corporations, shall remain as it is at present, while individuals shall in no case be permitted to charge a higher rate than eight per cent. Should a higher rate be charged, payment cannot be enforced, but as a penalty, the rate will be reduced to six per cent, and any amount above that rate which may have been paid may be recovered by an action at law, When no rate of interest has been agreed upon, the legal rate is to be as it is now—six per cent.

New Law of Evidence.—It is

New Law of Evidence.—It is being sought, in England, to amend the somewhat anomalous state of the law of evidence, which, on technical grounds, often excludes testimony of great importance and value, and which ought, in justice, to be laid before the jury. It is wished to be allowed to do this in cases where divorce is sought, arising out of adultery, in breach of promise and seduction cases, wherein the principal guilty parties would often testify, if allowed, and cut the case short, by presenting it beyond all doubt to the jury. It is also sought to permit any parties to give evidence on affirmation, who may make a decirration that they conscientiously object to taking an oath.
