DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, June 4. Sir Francis Hincks presented a message from His Excellency, with the Supplementary Estimates for the year ending June 30th, 1873.

The House then went into Committee of Supply, when a number of items were passed.

Hon. Mr. Langens moved that the House go into Committee to consider certain resolutions in relation to the improvement and enlargement of the canals of the Dominion. He said when Confederation was entered into it was understood the canals were to be enlarged as soon as possible.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole, and reported the resolutions without amendment.

In reference to the items in the supply bill for new custom houses and post-offices in different parts of the Dominion, Mr. Sturton said in Guelph they collected \$52,500 of custom revenue, and the business was all done in one corner of the Great Western freight shed.

The Wellingtons, which come in for "readjustment" are now represented in the House by two members of the Opposition and one Ministerialist.
