The Conservatives are bound to do their best for their candidate, and surely the Reformers will not do less for their's, especially as the prospect of austaining the protest is so good.

The Suez Canal not Paying, M. De Lesseps, the engineer and contractor for the "Suez Canal, has been in trouble lately about that great work. Its construction cost nearly fourteen million pounds, three and a half millions of which was subscribed by the Viceroy of Egypt, the balance of the stock being ly all held in France. In the last three years the traffic on the canal has increased nearly three fold, so that in number and tonnage the vessls that passed through it in the year 1873 were three times as great as those passing through in 1870; and during the few months of the present year the increase in trade has still continued. According to the first agreement the Company had power to collect a maximum duty of ten francs on every ton of capacity, but no particular standard of measurement was prescribed. In the year 1872 the company gave up their old system of measurement, which had given general satisfaction, and adopted a new one by thich they gained one third. Of course the merchants and ship owners remonstrated, and in compliance with their request the Sultan appointed a commission to enquire into the matter. It recommended the adoption of the old system of measurement, with some additional allowance as compensation for the change in the measuring of vessels. M. De Lesseps was dissatisfied with the decision of the commission, as he claims it would lessen the income of the company fifteen per cent, and some weeks ago he informed the Viceroy that he was no longer able to continue working the canal under the tariff im posed by the Commission, and that he should be obliged to dismiss his pilots and extinguish his lighthouses navigation. The Viceroy in reply, acting under instructions from the Ottoman Porte, advised M. De Lesseps not to take such steps, as in that event the Egyptian Government itself would take possession and work the canal. Following up these instructions the Viceroy took military possession of the canal, which brought M. De Lesseps to terms, who agreed to the new tariff and the new system of measurement. It is new system of measurement. It is to be regretted that this great triumph of engineering has not been a success in a pecuniary point of view, for it has been an immense benefit to commerce in shortening the great highway of travel between Europe and Asia.




