SOME LIVE LACROSSE TALK FROM COAST

New Westminster, B. C., May 2.—If ever there was a man who hoped and prayed that New Westminster would fall into the hands of Vancouver and Victoria as to the national lacrosse commission idea at the meeting of the B.C.L.A. held last Monday, that man was Con Jones.

The manager of the Vancouver team at the present time, thanking his lucky stars that the crisis was passed last Monday for had a break occurred that day a new manager and a new team would have been formed in Vancouver the following day which would have left Jones standing out in the cold and his lacrosse commission, the only thing he had left to remind him that he was once the greatest lacrosse man that ever came out of the golden west.

Back of this proposed new team was no other person than Matt Barr, who until a few months ago, was the close friend in lacrosse of Conard Jones. Matt was the chief adviser of Jones. It was he who was sent over to New Westminster time and again in order to patch up the tangles caused by the hot-headed work of Jones. It was he who would be seen with Jones boarding the Imperial Limited for the east every spring preparing to raid the N.L.U. and Big Four of their best players.

Times have changed during the past few months. Ascribing his reason for being out of lacrosse to the fact that he has built a summer cottage on Howe Sound and intends to spend his week ends with his family there, Matthew Barr has been the dark horse.

The truth of the matter is that he is through with Jones for keeps. It would not be surprising to see the former friend of Jones sitting in the private lavatory box of the New Westminster club during the progress of the games played in the Royal City this season.

Well, any way, a deep, dark plot was discovered by Jones early Monday morning, the day the league meeting was held.

BURNS ONLY LESS ATTENDANCE IS BETTER

Seven Hundred Dollars Was Dropped on Thursday's Contest—Promoter Is Less Than Thousand Dollars Ahead After Eight Months of Boxing.

"I feel like quitting altogether. I don't know but what I will." It was Tommy Burns who said this yesterday after he had checked up the past-boards which were taken at the double-headed boxing which was staged on Thursday night at the Manchester Arena. The net receipts of the affair were \$1462, the expenditures were \$525. Leaving a balance on the wrong side of the column of \$701. Not very encouraging, eh?

After eight months of promoting the boxing game in Calgary Tommy Burns finds himself in a position in addition to promoting the famous taking chances and acting as referee, Burns has participated in one battle himself.

These figures which are quoted below are from Burns private account and are published for the first time. They show the exact profit and loss of each contest:

A great many people in Calgary have the idea that Burns has a pretty soft thing of it in this promoting game, but all is not gold that glitters no more so all his boxing bouts money-making affairs. There are a thousand and one sources connected with the boxing show, of which the ordinary individual has no conception.

Thursday's Disappointing. The crowd on Thursday night was a great disappointment. For some reason or other the people were not there. A great many fans preferred to take the statement of a spasmoidic journal that Burns was bringing lemons to Calgary in preference to the judgment of Tommy Burns who is the very angle of the game and the result was that a mere corporals guard was on hand on Thursday night when the best boxing program ever staged in Canada was held.

Right now Burns is thinking seriously of quitting the game, in fact, yesterday he wired to McCarty not to leave Philadelphia until he heard from him.

The expenses of Thursday night's bout were just about the average for any contest. At the very least the expenses connected with the proposed McCarty contests will be \$7,500. Is it any wonder that Burns is hesitating about his ventures into the ring?

The writer has no say to nor. He will be no money out of pocket if the boxing game continues or not. He has written purely as an explanation of the facts of the case. The boxing game from the promoting standpoint at this minute, is on the verge of being abandoned by the present promoter and the reason is the poor attendance and the ingratitude of the fans. The writer is convinced that Tommy Burns has made an earnest effort to open up the game in Calgary and conduct it properly, principally because he thought it to be one of the best sports. Naturally he does not feel like working for nothing and he would not get a cent in addition. It is a legitimate business proposition and should yield a legitimate margin of profit. But it has not so yet and principally because the fans have had the idea that the promoter was getting the big end of it. If these sceptical ones will remember that at the very least he has collected fifty per cent. of the gate receipts when they are working on percentage. It is hard to get boxes and percentages. In fact, only once has a bout been held in the Manchester Arena when the boxes did not get a guarantee that their end of the purse would not be less than a certain amount.
