PREMIER SIFTON TELLS THE LONDON POST OF THE REMARKABLE DEVELOPMENT OF ALBERTA

Discuss Growth of Telephone System From Small Privately Owned Concern to a Large Provincially Controlled Institution Paying Handsomely.

The Hon. A. L. Sifton, premier of the province of Alberta, arrived in London yesterday from Canada on business connected with the financial requirements of the province. Mr. Sifton explained in an interview with a morning Post representative that the public debt was only £2,900,000 (including both the funded debt and treasury bills) and that this money has been spent in such public works as trunk roads and principal bridges for the purpose of opening up the country to settlement. The erection of the departmental offices, courts of justice, and other buildings necessary to the establishment of a state-owned telephone service which was claimed to be the cheapest and most efficient in the Canadian Dominion. The expenditure on the system up to the end of 1912 had been nearly \$3,000,000, but so great is the demand for an extension of the service that the requirements for new construction necessary to meet the demands of 1913 would involve a further expenditure of \$2,000,000. The amount of the public debt was reduced by last year's report to have been over 12 per cent.

The premier stated that immigration was being maintained at as high a rate as ever, and settlement and development were proceeding with unabated vigor throughout the province. The progress rendered a heavy expenditure on roads and bridges necessary, but the provincial government had also become guarantor for considerable railway extensions within the limits of the province. According to a report of Mr. Norman Harvey, secretary to the railways department, more miles of steel track had been laid by the various railway corporations in the last three years than in all the previous history of the territory now comprised in the province of Alberta, and of this total more than 50 per cent was built under the guarantee of the provincial government.

Mr. Sifton is of opinion that very important developments will take place in the future in connection with the opening up of the vast coal and other mineral resources of the province. Already there had been marvelous developments in the supply of natural gas to the towns of Medicine Hat, Lethbridge, Macleod, and Calgary, and the villages of the province. ANNUAL REPORT OF WOMEN'S COUNCIL OF SOCIAL SERVICE

IN the spring of 1912 it was decided by the Presbyterian church of Canada to open a Social Service Home in Calgary to help our young women in difficulty of any kind. Consequently on June 4, 1912, the first Social Service Home was opened at 821 Fifth Avenue West, with Miss Gordon as deaconess, and Miss Walker as president of the home itself was provided by Knox Presbyterian church, Calgary, under a committee of church members. The purpose of the maintenance of the home to be provided for by the general moral reform department of the Presbyterian church of Canada, and the furnishing to be done by the Women's Council and Calgary citizens.

The work here being a new one, it was scarcely known what field for work there would be, but before long it had grown to such proportions that our nine-roomed house was taxed to the utmost, sometimes having as many as 14 girls and three babies, besides the workers, whereas only eight girls and two workers could be comfortably accommodated.

The result was that another home at 1108, Seventh Avenue West was opened on June 12, 1912, with Mrs. Moffitt, deaconess, and Miss Sage, superintendent.

Many Girls are Helped.

From these homes as centres, about 140 girls have been taken during the past year. 65 girls have been taken into our homes, almost all of them remaining a few months and they have received protection and help. Of these, several were taken from most degrading physical, mental, and spiritual wrecks—very often having come originally from homes of luxury and refinement. Others were through the kindness of the authorities, sent into our cheery surroundings in preference to sending them to jail. Through visiting the jail weekly, many, on having served their sentence, have come to us until we could secure suitable positions for them. Different departments of the Children's Aid throughout the province have sent to us girls who were in serious danger to be kept as long as seemed desirable or wise. A large number have been brought into our homes from the hospitals on being discharged, when they were without means of support, or had become mothers. Some were kept until able once more to face the world. Others again, were just alone in a strange city, without a friend, for these also, there was always a welcome. We are glad to say, that with very few exceptions, there has been a response to the call for a better womanhood and a higher life.

The girls are trained in domestic science, plain sewing, and in some instances have been given private lessons in public school work, music, and other subjects. In every possible way they have been trained to live more wisely and well.

Our homes have been provided for their physical development, through the kindness of one of our city churches, and our physical director.

BRITISH MINERS WILL NOT GO TO WORK IN B. C.

Complain That They Were Brought Out Under False Pretences

Vancouver, June 6.—The forty-four miners from County Durham, England, who reached here yesterday are still making their headquarters at Labor Hall as they apparently do not intend to go to Vancouver Island, thought to be their destination, because a strike exists there. They are having a good time here and their hearts are being looked after by the United Mine Workers' organization, which called the island the "Island of the Nautilus Colliery, the Jingle-Pot, announced that it will resume work on Monday with non-union men.

In the meantime, several of the newly arrived British are reported to be making allegations against the representation in their hiring by alleged agents of the Canadian Collieries, Ltd. The affidavits declare that they did not have the amount of cash that is required by the immigration regulations.

Story of Fraser River Tragedy

Edmonton, June 6.—Further particulars of the drowning in Fraser River Canyon Saturday of four men, W. Kennedy, J. Dickson, L. Kaelip, Edmonton; P. J. Smith, who was in charge of the party, say that eight men were going through the canyon when the scow was broken in two. Four swam to shore but the others went down. The accident has caused contractors considerable anxiety, as every precaution has been taken in making the scows reliable and only selected men have been placed in charge. A report has been received from Mile 175, B. C., which states that four men went down the canyon last Friday on a raft and were wrecked, two of the men being drowned. The names of these men are not known. Full particulars are on the way up the river and will be sent later. One of the men is believed to be Joe McNeil. The bodies of Kennedy and his companions have not been recovered. There are so many eddies in the canyon that there is little possibility of a chance of recovering them. No person witnessed the accident. The party went through alone. Parts of the scow afterwards were seen in an eddy below. Both parties are supposed to be among the best river men on the Fraser. It is said the government will not allow any more scows to run the canyon until inspected and the cargo lightened.

BAKERS' UNION WILL BE FORMED TONIGHT

The latest labor union which is to be founded in Calgary is that of the bakers, and all who are interested in the organization will meet in the Labor Temple hall this evening at 8 o'clock.
