THE CREED IS TO BE REVISED

Committee's Report Adopted by the General Assembly.

The Confession of Faith, However, Will Not Be Changed, the Idea Simply Being to Clear Away Technicalities and Simplify Matters-Amended Text of the Reports to the Presbyterian General Assembly at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, May 28.—It was de-ided at yesterday morning's session f the Presbyterian General Assembly to hold the Assembly n the Fifth

When the order of the day—the re vision of the Confession of Faith— was reached, the moderator made a few remarks, advising against any hasty action.

James D. Moffatt, D.D., President

James D. Mollatt, D.D., Fresident of Washington and Jefferson Uni-versity, who, on Saturday, gave no-tice that he would offer an amend-ment to the majority report, was then recognized by the moderator

Dr. Moffatt said—"I hoped to amend recommendation B, to meet all objections, and to give it a new wording. Many good men who opposed the original form were alarmed by the word 'Summary.' I out the word Summary, and Substituting 'Statement,' which expresses just what we have in view.

Again, there is nothing in the original report to show what shall be done with the summary. I wish to remove all ambiguity and have stated plainly, that the committee to be appointed will be required to re-port to the next Assembly, and that a recommendation be made to the next Assembly to submit the entire subject to the Presbyteries."

The Majority Report.

"Your committee finds on examination of the returns from the Presbyteries the following facts:
"First. That the returns indicate that the church desires some change

in its credal statement.
"Second, That the returns indicate no change is desired

would in any way impair the integrity of the system of doctrine contained in the Confession of Faith.

'Third, These returns indicate that it is the mind of the church that the Confession shall be interpreted throughout in harmony with the teaching of Scripture that God is not willing that anyone shall perish, nor s it the decree of God, but the wick edness of their own hearts,

Jesus to all sinners.

"Fourth, These returns indicate that a plurality of the Presbyteries desired that changes would be made by some new statement of present Jesus to all sinners.

desire on the part of many Presby-eries for some revision of the pres-nt Confession, especially in chapter iii., chapter x., section 3; chapter xvi., section 7; chapter xxii., section 3; chapter xxv., section 6, with additional statements concerning the love of God for all men. missions and the Holy Spirit."

The Amended Recommendations

"A-We recommend that a committee as provided for by the form of government, chapter 33, section 3, be appointed by this assembly.

"B—(Amendment of Dr. Moffat)— We recommend that this committee be instructed to prepare and to submit to the next General Assembly, for such disposition as may be judged to be wise, a brief statement of the reformed faith, expressed as far as possible in untechnical terms. The said statement is to be prepared with a view to its being employed to give information and a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs, and not with a view to its becoming a substitute for or an alternative o our confession of faith. "C—We further recommend that

this committee be instructed to prethis committee be instructed to pre-pare amendments of chapter 3, chap-ter 10, section 3; chapter 16, section 7; Hapter 22, section 3; and chapter 25, section 6, of our confession of faith, either by modification of the ext. or by declaratory statement, out so far as possible by declaratory the church, so as more clearly to ex-ness the mind of the church, with press the mind of the church, with additional statements concerning the love of God for all men, missions and the Holy Spirit, it being understood that the review hall in no way impair the integrity of the system of doctrine set forth in our confession and taught in the Holy Scriptures."

The Parts to Be Amended. The Parts to Be Amended.

Chapter iii., which it is proposed to amend, relates to God's eternal decree and predestination. Chapter x., section 3, refers to "elect infants dying in infancy," and "all other elect persons" who are said to be "regeberated and saved by Christ through the Spirit, who worketh when and how he pleaseth." Chapter xix., section 7, pertains to the futility of good works done by sinful men. Chapter xxii., section 3, is the part of the confession that says it is a sin to refuse an oath touching anything good and just, being imposed a sin to retuse an out-free imposed thing good and just, being imposed by lawful authority. Chapter xxv., section 6, calls the Pope of Rome "that anti-Christ, that man of sin and son of perdition."

9-HOUR DAY ON RAILWAYS-

President's Coming Recommendation to the International Machinists' Convention at Toronto on June 3.

Washingtan, May 25.—President James O'Connell of the International Association of Machinets, announced

yesterday afternoon that he would re commend to the next annual convention of machinists at Toronto, be ginning June 3, that a date be set for a nine-hour day, without reduc for a nine-nour day, without reduc-tion in wages, on all the railroads of the country. On railways which fail to comply with this demand a strike will be ordered. This recommendation will be made in Mr. O'Connell's annual report.

Mr. O'Connell says that a railroad strike would probably involve 100,-000 men, including 40,000 machinists, the others being boilermakers, patternmakers and skilled workmen who work with the machinists at the various shops.
