Bulletins from Temple state that the tracks of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railroad are under water to the depth of 15 feet, south of Brownwood, and that nothing car be heard from places up the line. I stayed with her and had the gun in my hand ready to complete the I stayed with her and had the gun in my hand ready to complete the job by killing myself, when Farmer Shappard drove up and I became frightened and threw the gun away. It was my intention to return to the spot in the morning and find the gun and blow my own brains out, but you spoiled that.

negotiations.

The Vienna correspondent of The Daily Chronicle asserts that Russia's reply to the German note is very friendly, but that, although it appears to consent to Germany's pro-posal, it practically disapproves by asking whether it would not be best to open peace negotiations first, and to make the punishment of the insti-gators of the outrages the first sub-ject of discussion.

According to the Berlin correspond-ent of The Daily Express, Germany

will make a new proposition, namely, that the great powers form an international court to try the Chinese officials accused of complicity in the outrages.

London, Sept. 25 .- The British and Continental press is still discussing America's reply, which is generally regarded as encouraging Li Hung Chang to delay the negotiations.

Gen. Gribsky, Military Governor of Amur, has published elaborate regu lations, placing all the regions along the Amur region, now occupied by the Russians, entirely under Russian law and authority. The Chinese are forbidden to return to the left bank of the stream. He has also issued a preclamation declaring the annexation of Manchuria to be a punishment of the attention. for the attacks made on Blagovest chensk, and exhorting the inhabi tants hereafter to respect Russia's power, and to live in peace and quietss on their fields

To Leave Pekin Before Winter. Pekin, Sept. 16 (via Taku, Sept. 22, and Shanghai, Sept. 24.)—Changes in the plans of the allied commanders indicate the evacuation of Jekin before the winter sets in. The British leaders have counter-manded the order for extensive winter supplies, and the Americans are making evident preparatio


