Interesting Addresses by Rev. C. E. M. Intyre and Other Advocates of the Cause,

The weekly temperance meeting in Victoria Hall Saturday evening was of an earnest, enthusiastic character. Rev. G. Trotter Carr was to have been a speaker but was prevented by illness. Rev. C. E. Bond; Dr. Ziegler and Dr. Arnott, Messrs. D. A. McDermid, C. R. Sayer, J. H. Bowman and others.

The chairman, in opening, expressed have pleasure at being present, and dwelt on the advancement of the cause. His parents had been teetotallers and as he had united hinself with a church that prohibited intoxicants, it was little wonder that he had espoused the temperance cause, and used his efforts in forwarding its interests while endeavoring to preach the doctrines of his church, in endeavoring to observe its requirements, and to keep and observe its requirements, and to keep a enforce its discipline. I understand in this city there are 69 places where liquot is sold. At a very low estimate each one of these places takes in on an average SS per day—in fact, I'm told that is much under the figure. Well, suppose that the parties who keep those barrooms believed the law, by keeping them closed on sundays, election days, and other days stipulated by law. That would allow them 300 days in the year, in which they could legally sell liquor, with average receipts of SS each per day, that would make a total of S2,400 per annum, which, when multiplied by 69, leaves something like \$165,000 spent in the city, but large enough the city, but large enough the city, but large sold in legitimate business, what would rejoice!
